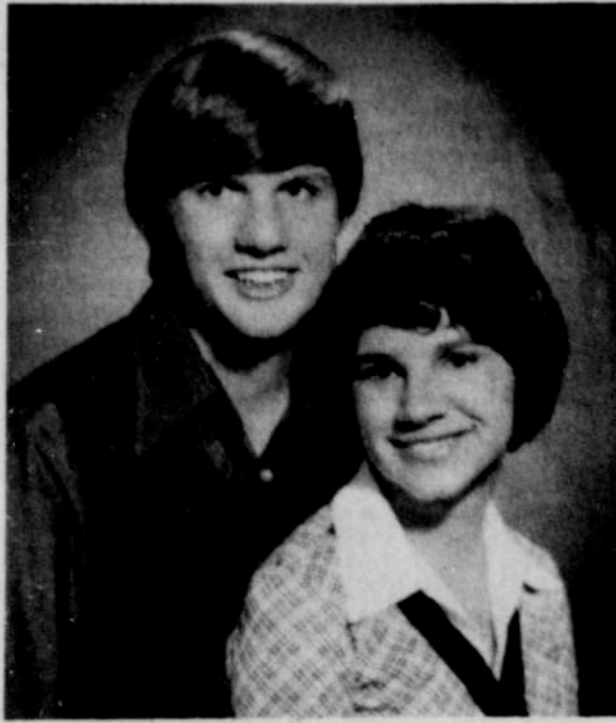


### Wedding Plans Made

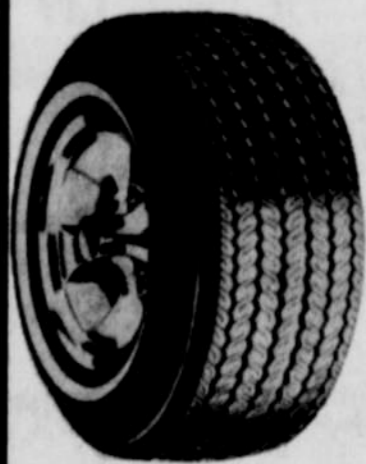
