

Architect Selected For Senior Housing

J. M. Miller, President of Hammond Development Corporation, announced today that the architect for the proposed Nyssa senior citizen apartment project has been selected. Don W. Richardson, member of the American Institute of Architects, was chosen to design the 40-unit apartment project to enhance the livability by its future tenants.

The layout of the building will be in the shape of an "L". Utilizing this design, interior hallways will service

the residents' apartments, leading to and from the central lobby-recreation area. This interior lobby-recreation area will include the main entrance to the project, a sitting area facing out onto the landscaped grounds, project office, recreation room, and laundry facilities.

Farmers Home Administration has been presented with the loan application and it is now in the process of a preliminary review of the proposal.

Home Canning Sessions Set
