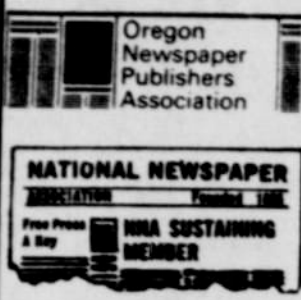

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Improvements Are Many

Two important events occurred to our immediate north last week which will have very beneficial results on our area and the Pacific Northwest as a whole. We refer to the dedication of the White Bird hill bridge and section of U.S. 95 highway, and the dedication of the three dams on the lower Snake River and the Port of Lewiston.

The completion of these dams and locks in the Snake "makes Idaho, Oregon, Montana and Washington regional partners in the business of World trade," Oregon's Governor Bob Straub said when dedicating the Little Goose Dam and Lock.

Arthur Reider, president of the Pacific Northwest Waterways Association, said that "this is the closest man will come to a Northwest Passage," as he dedicated Lower Monumental Dam and Lock.

When Idaho Governor Cecil D. Andrus dedicated Lower Granite Dam and Lock, he said that "this was the final structure needed to complete a shipping waterway all the way from the Pacific Ocean to Idaho, 464 miles."

Finally, last Friday, Washington Senator Warren Magnuson and Idaho Senator Frank Church dedicated the Port of Lewiston. Economically, Idaho is now a coastal state, and the region's produce can now move to national and international markets at lower freight rates. This makes Idaho products more competitive, and leaves a little more profit in the region.

The new highway to the sea, being a two-way street, can also provide the advantage of lower freight rates for incoming goods. And if this proves too competitive, could it not well force reduction in the costs of moving freight by other means?

Highway 95 improved

Perhaps of almost more significance nearer home are the improvements being made on Highway 95. Straightening and widening of this old "goat trail" into a modern, safe and scenic highway helps greatly in opening our markets from this productive area.

Mesa hill is almost finished, now Whitebird hill has been completed, contracts for Lewiston hill will be offered later this fall, and our north-south access will soon be almost as good as our east-west facilities.

For many years our Intermountain states have exported our young people, mainly because there were not sufficient jobs for them at home. Developing productive occupations for them nearer home is a worthy goal. Improvements in all forms of transportation - water, air, rail and road - strengthens the economy and provides those jobs which are needed.

There are some who, either wistfully or spitefully, clamor continuously for stagnation of our economy. They don't want dams, power plants, highways, abundant cheap power, utilization of our forest products, and conservation of our priceless water.

We don't share their apprehension. Instead, we get a thrill out of each new engineering achievement which insures a better way of life for us and our children. We were present when Owyhee Dam was dedicated. It was a thrill to look down into Lewiston harbor last Friday and see ocean-going barges with the names Tidewater and Shavers, and to know that from this day on they will help carry the produce of our Intermountain area to the world.

In between these two dedications just over 40 years apart, we have seen Bonneville, Grand Coulee, The Dalles, McNary, Ice Harbor, Brownlee, Oxbow, Hells Canyon, Lower Monumental, Little Goose, Lower Granite all come on the line to give us power, conserve our water, and provide transportation.

True, the salmon no longer leap over the rocks of Owyhee Canyon to their spawning grounds, and we have never, and probably never will, spear one of the beauties. We have every confidence, though, that the fish runs will be restored up the Columbia and Snake as engineers and conservationists work together.

We watched as floodwaters wiped out Vanport in 1948 in a horrible waste of precious water to the ocean. Those waters today are providing power, jobs, recreation, irrigation, transportation and untold benefits to a vast region.

We think, overall, that is one very great improvement.

G. Eva Boydell

Services for Gertrude Eva Boydell, 83, who died Friday, June 20, 1975 at the Malheur Memorial Hospital Nursing Home were conducted Monday at 10 a.m. at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Nyssa by the Rev. Letitia Croom. Interment was at Evergreen Cemetery, Ontario, under the direction of Lienkaemper Chapel, Nyssa.

She was born September 22, 1891 in Bury, Quebec, Canada and came to Nyssa with her family. Mr. and Mrs. Josiah Boydell in March 1904. She attended school at St. Margaret's Hall in Boise, and graduated from Nyssa High School in 1911, the first graduating class of that school. She graduated from Monmouth Normal School; and summer school sessions included Scope School in Long Beach, Calif.; San Francisco Normal; Bellingham Normal; Lewiston Normal; and the University of Oregon.

Miss Boydell taught school in Oregon for 45 years starting at Owyhee School south of Nyssa and including Ontario, Beaverton, Albany and The Dalles. She taught three generations of Nyssa students before retiring in June, 1956.

She was a lifelong member of the Episcopal Church, and a charter member of St. Paul's Guild, Nyssa. She was a member of the National, State, County and local Education Association; a charter member of the Golden Rule chapter, Eastern Star; and a charter member of the Gasper White Shrine #3, The Dalles.

She is survived by a sister, Mrs. Britt (Elizabeth) Nedry, Boise; five nieces; five nephews; and 31 grand nieces and grand nephews. She was preceded in death by a sister Ethelwyn Sarazin; and two brothers, Arthur Boydell and Blainey Boydell.

Memorials may be given to St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Nyssa.
