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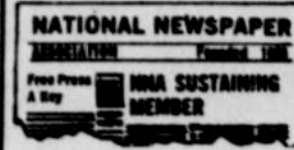
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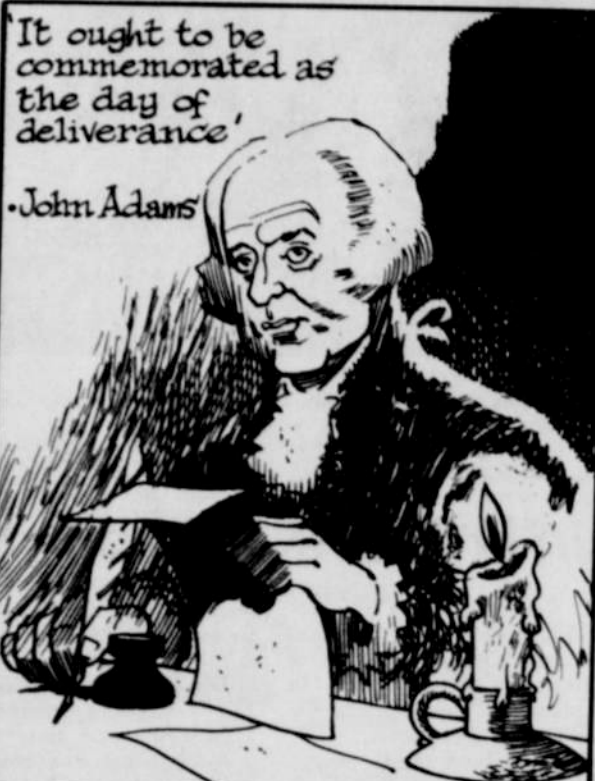

The man? John Adams.

The event? Adoption of the Declaration of Independence, which he hoped would be commemorated as "the Day of Deliverance, by solemn acts of Devotion to God Almighty."

John William Hoare Morris, 69, passed away at the Woodland Park Hospital, Portland, June 13, 1975, after an extended illness.

He was born to Mr. and Mrs. John W. Hoare, of Portland, Oregon on April 16, 1906. He was the eldest of eight children.

He moved with his parents to Canyon City, Oregon, in about 1926, where he worked with his father in the gold mines.

In the early 1930's, they moved to the Nyssa area with a prospect of work at the Owyhee Dam Project. He met and later married Marvel L. Fox, September 4, 1935. After the birth of their first son, they moved to Seneca, Oregon and reared their family there. After moving from Seneca to Nyssa, they purchased and operated the Pounds Grocery Store and later the Sugar City 5&10.

In 1968, John and Marvel moved back to Portland, where Jack was a partner with his son Richard in the D & D Auto Body Shop. He worked there until his retirement, after a serious illness in 1974.

Surviving Jack are his wife, Marvel; five sons, John Wm. Fr. of Alameda, Calif., Richard W. of Portland, Vernon R. of Portland, Larry L. of Fort Knox, Kentucky, and Jerry D. of Hayward, Calif.; two sisters, Lucille Stimson of Missoula, Mont. and Marguerite Boentchen of Garibaldi, Oregon; two brothers, Willis N. Hare of Happy Camp, Calif. and Robert P. Norman of Happy Camp, California and 22 grandchildren.

Funeral services were held at Batman Funeral Home on Monday, June 16, at 1 p.m. Interment was made at Skyline Memorial Garden Cemetery.

 But always a beautiful memory.

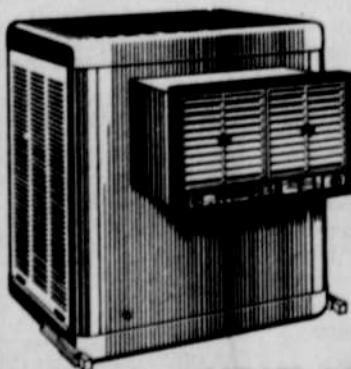

THREE COINS HAVE BEEN REDESIGNED to commemorate the Bicentennial, and before the end of the year the Federal Reserve System will supply the nation's commercial banks with the newly redesigned quarter, half dollar and dime.

According to Mary Brooks, Director of the U. S. Mint, the coins will look much the same on the head side, with George Washington on the quarter, John F. Kennedy on the half dollar, and Dwight D. Eisenhower on the dime. The only difference will be the dates 1776-1976, and these were changed to

celebrate our country's 200th birthday.

The designs on the backs of the coins were chosen in a national design competition. The colonial drummer boy is on the back of the quarter, Independence Hall on the half dollar, and the Liberty Bell superimposed over the moon was chosen for the dime reverse.

"Liberty" was the rallying cry of the American Revolution, and "Liberty" has been proclaimed and inscribed on each and every coin since the creation of the U. S. mint in 1792.
