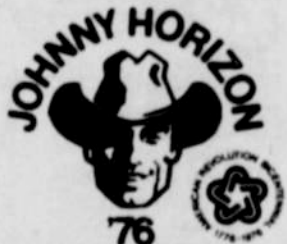

Fatima has one sister and three brothers. She reports their weather remains at about 75 degrees, and much time is spent on their beaches. The younger brothers plan to spend 18 days in

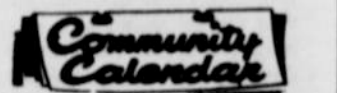
