He is a member of the 83rd armored Rcn. Bn. of the third armored "spearhead" division, which is one of the veteran armored divisions.

Women's Workshop To Teach Self-Expression

Assertiveness Workshop for Women, a Treasure Valley Community College Community Education program will be offered Saturday July 26, from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Cammie O'Shaughnessy will be the workshop director.

The basic principles of passive, aggressive and assertive communication will be presented and demonstrated and small groups will practice assertive behavior. Assertiveness, according to Ms. O'Shaughnessy, describes positive, honest communication rather than either defensive or hostile communication. The purpose of the workshop is to help participants learn to express themselves com-

fortably and in an honest way. The principles discussed will have application in formal, social, work, and family situations.

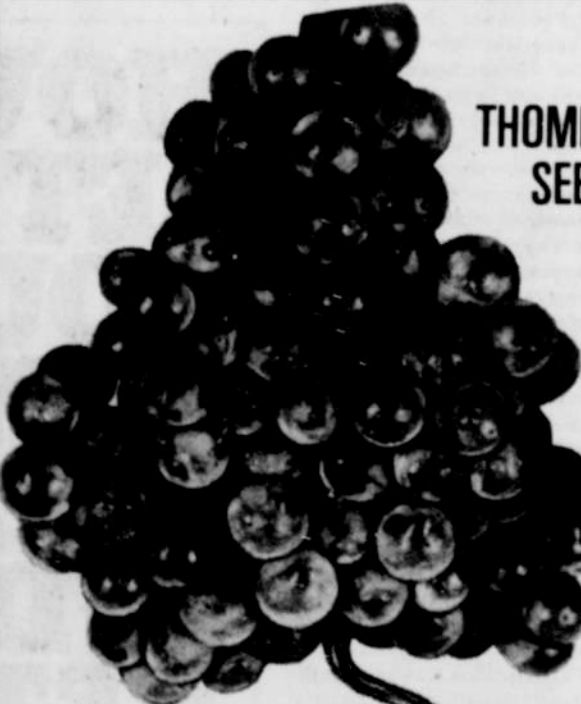
