

Club Learns A Colorful Art

Fern Groves, Parma, told Owyhee Garden Club members, "Add to the many ways to enjoy flowers that of drying them and making lasting pictures and colorful, dainty bouquets to decorate the home." As hostess at a meeting last week, she gave examples of drying and arranging flowers and weeds, which, she said, add interest to arrangements.

Marigolds, the club members learned, are excellent for preservation, since they dry easily and remain in sturdy condition when finished.

Some varieties of flowers and weeds can be cut while in prime condition and air-dried by tying and hanging upside down in a well-ventilated area. Other fragile specimens

can be spray painted with colorful lacquer. A common use of this art is with a drying agent, such as silica gel or a mixture of borax and corn meal.

The group was urged to experiment with color, since some flowers retain their color, when dried, longer than others.

Ellen Strickland announced, during the meeting, that the club had received an award from Sears in the form of \$30 for the completion of the Owyhee Cemetery Project.
