## Army Apprenticeship Planned For Near Future

The first Army-wide apprenticeship program will begin at many Army posts in a matter of months. Acting Army Secretary Norman R. Augustne predicts the Army's decision to accept national apprenticeship standards may benefit "many tens of thousands of soldiers" each year. The agreement signed by Labor Secretary John T. Dunlop and Augustine makes it the first such program in any of the Armed Forces according to Defense and Labor Department officials.

Coming at a time when such training is in heavy demand and Vo-Techs are turning students away due to lack of space, initial programs will affect jobs involved with operation and repair of heavy equipment vehicles, followed by health care, food service, and automotive maintenance. There are about 460 possible programs.
