Lightning Caused Fires Burn 160 BLM Acres

Lightning-caused range fires burned an estimated 160 acres in Malheur County this week, according to Bureau of Land Management fire control officials.

An electrical storm late Sunday afternoon ignited a 50 acre blaze in rugged Leslie Gulch. A pumper, a hand crew, and a helicopter with a water bucket checked the fire. Also Sunday, BLM fire crews controlled a 30 acre fire near Parsnip Peak, south of Jordan Valley, and another 30 acre blaze in the Negro Rock area south of Vale.

All three were declared out by Monday afternoon.

Again, thunderstorms late Monday are blamed for five new range fires. Two spot fires, totalling less than an acre each, were rained-out five miles south of Harper.

A grass and brush fire four miles north of Castle Rock was extinguished shortly after midnight Tuesday, and a blaze two miles north of Juntura was contained about sunrise Tuesday.

By mid-day Tuesday, another fire was burning slowly but uncontrolled in steep, rocky terrain west of Warm Springs Reservoir. Crews from Malheur Guard Station in Juntura and from the Burns BLM district were on that 40-acre blaze.

Favorite Recipes

Short Ribs with Southwestern Flavor

Look for short ribs among that array of beef cuts when you want to treat your family to an especially satisfying meal. Short ribs are somewhat boney, but very tasty, so plan on 3/4 to 1 pound per person, reports the Oregon Beef Council.

For a flavorful treat, try this recipe for Southwestern Short Ribs. After the ribs are oven-cooked until tender, they're coated with a spicy brush-on sauce and barbecued to perfection. It's the seasoning in the sauce that gives these ribs their name.

Southwestern Short Ribs

4 lbs. beef short ribs, cut into pieces
 1 can (8 oz.) tomato sauce
 1/4 cup water
 1 tbs. honey
 1 tsp. salt
 1 tsp. chili powder
 1/4 tsp. hot sauce
 1/8 tsp. coriander

Place short ribs in deep skillet or Dutch oven. Cover and bake in a moderate oven (350 deg. F.) for 2 hours or until ribs are tender, turning after first hour. Combine tomato sauce, water, honey, salt, chili powder, hot sauce and coriander in saucpan and cook slowly for 15 minutes, stirring occasionally. Place short ribs on rack, brush with sauce and barbecue 3 to 5 inches from the heat. Cook 10 to 15 minutes, turning and brushing with sauce occasionally. 4 to 6 servings.

Oregon Geyser Attracts A Lot of Attention

REFRESHINGLY COLD. Ice cold beverages, whether tart, sweet, thick or thin, bland or spiked are welcomed the year around at any time of day.

Frozen beverages are available in a wide range of sizes and varieties. No matter what the beverage, the thing to remember is serve Refreshingly Cold. If ice is required use plenty of it; if no ice is needed, serve it well chilled.

Sparkle your beverages and you'll become a "hostess with the mostess." Following are beverages prepared with frozen juices, drinks or ades.

1. Fruit Swizzle—combine lemonade, orange juice and water; garnish with a strawberry and a lime wedge on a swizzle stick.

2. Orange Blush—combine orange juice, cranberry juice and sugar to taste; garnish with an orange slice.

3. Grapefruit Fliz—combine grapefruit juice, gingerale, sugar to taste and add a hint of green food coloring; garnish with a lemon stuck with whole cloves.

4. Purple Fling—this is a combination of grape juice, pineapple-orange juice, sugar to taste, and carbonated water; garnish with a melon ball kabob.

5. Fruit Shrub—combine any two fruit juices and top with a small scoop of fruit ice or sherbet.

6. Wikikiwi Punch—combine fruit punch with lemonade and gingerale and garnish with fresh mint leaves.

7. Cranberry Lemon Frost—a combination of cranberry juice cocktail, lemonade, corn syrup and lemon sherbet whirled in a blender for a few seconds.

8. Davey Jones Cocktail—combine tomatoe juice and clam juice seasoned with worcestershire sauce and hot pepper sauce; garnish with a wedge of lemon and whole shucked clam.

Yes, Oregon even has a geyser. In fact, the Beaver State's version is the only continuously spouting geyser in the nation.

Old Perpetual contributes to the state's diverse array of attractions by shooting its column of near-boiling water 60 feet in the air in south-central Oregon. Located just north of Lakeview off U. S. Highway 395, the geyser gurgles and spouts round-the-clock with its 200-degree torrents falling in a gentle rain or disappearing into a cloud of steam, depending on the season.

The geyser has definite attributes besides its worthiness as a scenic attraction. Because of its steady production of heat, surrounding lakes are never frozen-over making the area a favored resting place for waterfowl, and thus a popular place for birdwatchers. Canadian honkers are among the feathered residents.

Students of geothermal activity also find the geyser area an interesting stopover since an adjacent lodge and restaurant taps Old Perpetual's resources for its heating system and hot water supply.

Nearby Lakeview boasts its own distinctiveness. It claims the highest elevation of any city in Oregon, 4,800 feet, and native like to call it Oregon's "tallest town."

From it, roads stretch in all four directions to some of the most beautiful and unspoiled land in Oregon.

Traveling north of Lakeview, you will have a close-up view of Abert Rim, a 30-mile-long fault. Standing 2,000 feet above the blue waters of Lake Abert, the Rim is the highest exposed geologic fault in North America.

Or drive 15 miles south of Lakeview on U. S. 395 to Goose Lake, straddling the California-Oregon border. A campground and recreation area on the east side provides easy access to the lake which is a magnet for anglers and boating enthusiasts.

Northeast of Lakeview, the Hart Mountain National Antelope Refuge lures herds of fleet antelope, mule deer and Bighorn sheep to its secluded grasslands more than 3,000 feet above the surrounding plain. A road leads to the Refuge off State Highway 140, 16 miles east of the latter's junction with U. S. 395.

West of Lakeview on State Highway 140, beyond the Quartz Mountain Pass, Gearhart Mountain looms over the wilderness of the same name.
