Home Owners May File Claims Against Builders

Any home owner who believes he has a claim against a residential builder, remodeler or repair contractor for breach of contract should not delay filing his

claim, says the Oregon Builders Board. "Some home owners wait too long," said Florence Doerfler, Administrator of the Board. "Arbitration is most effective if the Builders Board is notified within one year from the completion of the work."

The Builders Board, an arm of the State Department of Commerce, was created by the 1971 Legislature to aid consumers in the home construction area. The Home Builders Law requires that anyone holding himself out as a residential contractor register with the Board, post a bond or other security and maintain a minimum amount of liability insurance. When a builder goes out of business, his security is

released a year from the end of his registration. For this reason, Mrs. Doerfler said home owners should not procrastinate in filing claims. Members of the Board, which includes three builders, said consumers in the home construction and repair field should follow these guidelines when having work done:

1. Be sure any contractors from whom you get bids hold current Builders Board registration. Ask to see his Certificate of Registration.

2. Get written bids from at least three contractors.

3. Get a written, signed contract describing the work to be done and the fees to be paid.

Unregistered builders may not be issued building

permits, file liens or sue in state courts for unpaid compensation.

County Receives Highway User Revenue

Distribution of \$6,000,818.82 in highway-user funds to the 36 counties of the state was announced today by the State Highway Division.

The allocation is based on the statutory 20 percent for the period April 1 to June 30, 1975. The funds come from the following sources: motor vehicle registration and operator's license fees, gasoline tax, use fuel tax, motor carrier fees, and fines and penalties collected for violations of the size and weight statutes where complaints are made by the Highway Division weighmasters.

Because of the action taken during the recent legislative session, starting in August, 1975, the apportionment of the counties will be distributed on a monthly basis rather than quarterly. The allocation to each county is based on the number of vehicles registered in it. Malheur County will receive \$75,608.47 based on 22,097 vehicles.
