Berry Syrups Have Versatile Uses

Berry syrups to brighten winter desserts, top breakfast pancakes, flavor fruit punches or stuff Christmas stockings can be made with easy directions given in a recently-revised Oregon State University Extension circular.

Strawberries, blackberries, blueberries or raspberries or combinations of several fruits can be used to make the syrups. The circular describes an easy and fast way to extract juice by using cellulose pulp, then provides a basic recipe for making the syrup. When properly processed, the jars of syrup can be stored on the shelf for later use.

Oregonians may obtain a free copy of the circular from their County Extension offices by asking for EC 68S, "Making Berry Syrups at Home."
