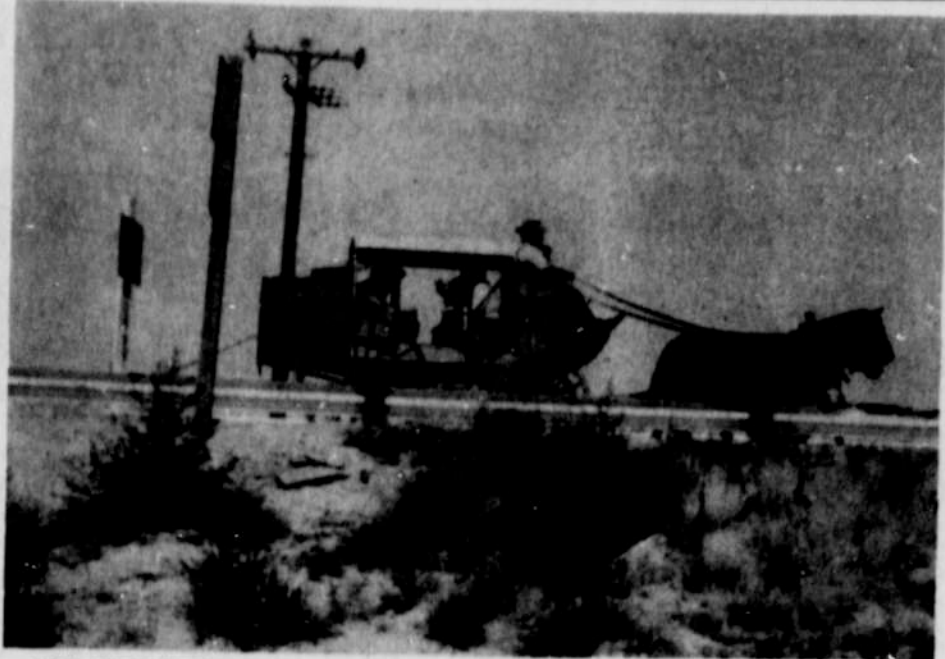
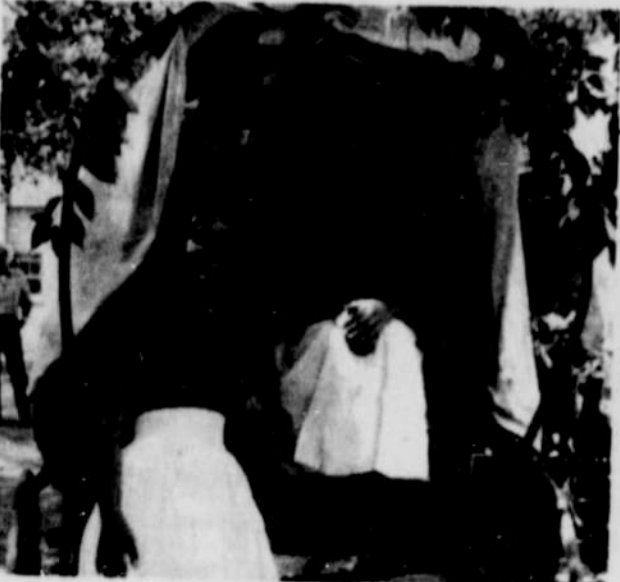

Department Announces Funds

The State Highway Division has announced the distribution of \$3,600,491.28 in highway-user tax funds to the incorporated cities of Oregon. Nyssa, with an estimated population of 2,735 will receive \$7,330.61. Ontario, with an estimated population of 7,743, will receive \$20,753.54.

The quarterly allocation will go to 240 incorporated cities in Oregon whose combined population now totals 1,320,000. The allocation is based on the statutory 12 percent for the period April 1 to June 30, 1975. Because of action during the recent legislative session, starting in August the apportionment to the cities will be distributed on a monthly basis rather than quarterly.

The funds come from the following sources: motor vehicle registration and operators' license fees, gasoline tax, use fuel tax, motor carrier fees, and fines and penalties collected for violations of the size and weight statutes where complaints were made by the Highway Division weighmasters.

The apportionment is based on the population of each city as determined by the Center for Population Research and Census, Portland State University. The population figures are as of June 30, 1975.
