Your County Agent Says

This summer people from the Vale and Nyssa areas have brought us numerous samples of large wasps for identification. These giants of the yellow jacket tribe run from one to one and one-half inches in length. They are called cicada killers and have the scientific name of *Sphecius speciosus*. The wasps have a formidable appearance, but don't go on the war path unless molested.

Adults congregate around trees and shrubs and feed on sap and nectar. They are ground nesters. The female wasp digs a hole in the ground and provisions it with an insect that has been immobilized by stinging. Then the wasp lays an egg on the insect. The eggs hatch into larvae that feed on the entombed insects. The larvae mature and live in the soil until the following summer when they emerge as a new generation of adult wasps.

Miracle Fertilizers, Activators and Soil Conditioners

In spite of our educational efforts and a much more knowledgeable society, farmers are continually exposed and can be taken-in by the sales pitch for miracle products. There are consumer protective agencies. We have labeling and product guarantee regulations. None-the-less, the farm seems to be a place to move low value or worthless products. Some state this is freedom of choice and each must decide the merits of a product. We concur on freedom but when a privilege is abused, then we need certain restraints.

If a product is as good as the salesman reports, then he should back up his claim in writing. Some guidelines to follow:

1. Did the company obtain a license from the State Department of Agriculture and markets to sell the particular product?

2. Testimonials are a poor source of information. Those which are used may have been screened.

3. Because someone uses the product—or has some—is no proof of acceptance. Even named researchers may have samples of the product—(it was given to them).

4. If claims for yield increases are made then—where were they obtained? out-of-state trials may be worthless under local conditions. —What are the probabilities of such yield increases? —Were such yield increases obtained in replicated plots on soils of comparable characteristics? —Were placement, rate, time of application, analysis, etc. comparable?

5. Quality improvement. What did they mean by "Quality"? It could refer to protein or oil content, flavor, color or something else.

Carefully evaluate all new products! Demand adequate proof of their value under your own conditions or operations. Before you invest—investigate!
