

Willner Seeks Nomination As Attorney General



Don Willner

Former State Senator Don Willner, 49, announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination as Attorney General of Oregon.

At press conferences in Portland, Eugene, and Medford, Willner emphasized the role of the Attorney General as "the people's lawyer" with an obligation to "enforce vigorously those laws vital to the well-being of our citizens and state."

Specifically mentioning laws relating to consumer protection, natural resources and unfair business practices, the long-time state legislator and attorney pointed out that he wrote or

helped write many of those laws.

"I want to see them work," he said. Willner identified two other key functions of the Attorney General—one as legal counsel to state government, one as advocate of each individual citizen's right to equal justice.

He said the Attorney General "must be the people's watchdog insuring that state bureaucrats observe the law as all citizens should. The Attorney General must play a major role in assuring the fair and even-handed administration of justice."

Willner, a partner in the Portland law firm of Willner, Bennett, Riggs & Skarstad, has practiced law for 24 years with emphasis on public interest law. He served 10 years as state senator, two years as state representative. He has, since 1973, served frequently as circuit judge pro tem by appointment of the chief justice of the state supreme court.

Willner was national president of the Consumer Federation of America from 1971-72—whose affiliates had 30 million members. He is currently chairman of the Governor's Commission on Youth.

Serve Soft, Crisp Cookies With Milk



Butter, Cream and Yogurt
In Delectable Cookies

Delectable dairyland cookies for summer are right off the yum yum tree! And they fill the bill for all occasions from picnic lunches to fancy parties. Because home baked cookies are a favorite sweet treat, they should be extra delicious and a little bit special, too. The wonderful flavor of this cookie trio comes from the generous use of fresh, natural dairy products and other high quality ingredients. As experienced bakers know, the incomparable taste of pure creamery butter, cream cheese, milk, cream and other dairy foods just cannot be duplicated with substitute ingredients.

Chocolate lovers will especially welcome this bonanza of new cookie ideas. For daintiness, bake the crisp, lacy florentines. The light whipping cream batter is interestingly textured with chopped almonds and raisins. After baking, the cookies get a chocolate glaze on one side. Cream cheese brownies are a moist, luscious version of an old favorite - the recipe calls for one package of cream cheese plus half a cup of butter. Try cutting into triangles for a new look. And last, there are plump cookies made with yogurt, semisweet chocolate and chopped nuts. Yogurt, like other cultured dairy products, adds special flavor, texture and moistness to baked goods. For the moister type cookies, avoid over baking and drying out. Milk and fruit coolers or milk and ice cream combos are refreshing summer drinks to serve with cookies.

To make all your home baking easy and successful, here is a helpful technique to use in mixing. Begin with slightly softened, fresh butter. Then beat in the sugar until the mixture is light in color and smooth and creamy in texture. Always store butter covered in the refrigerator to preserve its fine, delicate flavor.

FROSTED FLORENTINES

...crisp elegant cookies with chocolate glaze below

- 1/2 cup whipping cream
- 1/2 cups sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup chopped almonds
- 1/4 cup dark seedless raisins, chopped
- 1/4 cup flour
- 1/2 teaspoon almond extract
- 6 ounces semisweet chocolate

Mix cream with sugar, salt, almonds, raisins, flour and almond extract. Drop by level

teaspoon measures 2 or 3 inches apart on well oiled baking sheet. Flatten cookies with wet knife blade. Bake in 350 deg. oven 9 or 10 minutes or until cookies begin to firm. Loosen carefully with thin metal spatula and transfer to wire rack to cool. Melt chocolate over hot water. Place cookies upside down. Spread chocolate on bottom of cookies with spatula or back of spoon. Let dry on racks. Makes 4 dozen (2 to 2 1/2-inch) cookies.

CREAM CHEESE BROWNIES

...cakelike texture is moist and rich

- 1/2 cup butter
- 4 ounces semisweet chocolate
- 1 (3-ounce) package cream cheese
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 3 eggs
- 1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract
- 1 cup flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup chopped walnuts

Melt butter and chocolate over low heat, stirring occasionally. Cool. Beat cream cheese with sugar. Beat in eggs and vanilla, then chocolate mixture. Add flour, salt and nuts. Mix to combine. Turn into buttered 9-inch square baking pan. Bake in 350 deg. oven 35 to 40 minutes or until pick inserted into center comes out dry. Do not overbake. Cool. Cut into triangles, squares or bars. Makes about 36 pieces.

YOGURT CHOCOLATE COOKY DROPS

...yogurt gives nice tang to drop cookies

- 1/2 cup butter
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 egg
- 1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract
- 3 ounces semisweet chocolate, melted and cooled
- 2 1/4 cups flour
- 1/2 teaspoon soda
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 (8-ounce) carton plain yogurt
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts
- Granulated sugar

Beat butter with 1 cup sugar. Beat in egg, vanilla and cooled chocolate. Stir in flour mixed with soda and salt, alternately with yogurt. Stir in nuts. Drop by spoonfuls onto greased baking sheet. Flatten with glass dipped in sugar. Bake in 400 deg. oven 8 to 10 minutes. Do not overbake. Cool on wire racks. Makes 3 dozen (2 1/2 to 3-inch) cookies.

TIPS FOR MEN

Way back—when you were a little shaver, you knew that no man looked his best with chin stubble.

Summer doesn't make things any easier. However, welcome the season's solar rays and beach breezes after your winter underwraps, they tend to dry out and roughen the skin. So does the full blast of that hot-weather comforter: the air conditioner.

One way to save face, especially if your skin is so tender that you wince at a razor-blade's touch, is to switch to an electric razor. World War II Attacks On West Coast

The story of Japanese attacks on the Pacific Coast during World War II is told in "Retaliation," a new book just published by the Oregon State University Press.

Author of the book is Medford writer Bert Webber. "Retaliation" details the activities of both the Japanese and the Allies along the U. S. and Canadian west coasts during World War II. Webber spent more than four years collecting data from American, Canadian and Japanese sources, and two

years ago was commissioned by OSU to write the book.

Included is extensive information on the Japanese balloon bomb offensive which sent thousands of bomb-laden paper balloons across the Pacific via the jet stream. The balloons, launched in 1944-45 landed throughout the Northwest and as far eastward as Michigan, Kansas and Texas. Other chapters discuss the submarine strikes against the West Coast, and the airplane bombing of the southern Oregon forests. Among those

interviewed for this portion of the book was Nobuo Fujita, the Japanese pilot responsible for the bombings, who tells of his flight in the small fold-away airplane whose hangar was a submarine.

Webber also presents the Allied strategy, describing both policies and installations along Canadian and U. S. coastlines.

"Retaliation" is No. 6 in the OSU Press series, "Studies in History."

All stockmen and their families are invited to attend this social event of the Livestock Association.

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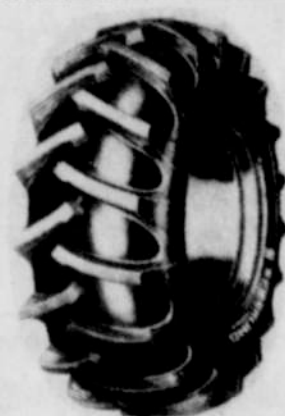
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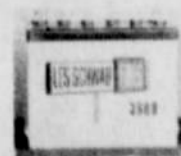


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
