Dr. Grant Hughes, county health officer, pleaded for city-wide cooperation to stem this area's polio epidemic, during the regular weekly meeting of the Chamber of Commerce in Brownie's Cafe Wednesday.

"When overwhelming di-

sease strikes, its everybody's business," he said. "Here in our county, we have had 31 cases of polio this fall. And 21 of these have been in the immediate Nyssa area."

He didn't spare his punches in urging that the Chamber accept its part in the civic duty of public health concern by appointing a qualified committee to work along with the County health Department.

"Why, people are becoming scared to death to come visit us," he said. "The rumor is going around that Nyssa is a hotbed for polio."
