Community College Report

Completion of a two-year comprehensive study of the strengths and deficiencies of Oregon's 13 community colleges has been announced by the Foundation for Oregon Research and Education (FORE), a privately funded group composed of business and professional leaders from around the state. Lawrence L. Rennett, Chairman of the Study Committee, presented a copy of the study to Verne A. Duncan, Oregon's Superintendent of Public Instruction.

Among its 40 conclusions, the FORE study recommends:—the Legislature define carefully and clearly the areas of responsibility for management and the areas of responsibility for labor; establish clear basic ground rules within which collective bargaining should take place, to hasten fair and constructive agreements between administrators and faculty;—that local community college boards of education monitor programs and drop courses when enrollments fall below an established minimum, priorities shift, or occupational opportunities diminish;

—closer cooperation between community colleges and four year schools to make credits earned at the two year schools more freely transferrable within the state system of higher education;

—retention of the present funding formula (50 per cent state general fund, 30 per cent district property taxes, 20 per cent student tuition) and;

—avoid or eliminate ranking, i.e. full Professorship, Assistant Professor, Associate Professor, for community college instructors;

—better utilization of existing college buildings in lieu of further construction.

The study also recommends that the Oregon State Board of Education adopt a systematic method of program evaluation for community colleges to insure better accountability to the legislature and taxpayers.

Rennett stated "We were impressed with the diversity of the 13 colleges and of the importance of keeping the fine line between independence and state leadership which seems so eminently successful."

FORE recommended the present decentralized form of governance for the community college system be continued giving the schools local autonomy within broad state policies under the direction of a local community college district Board.

SOVIET MISSILE UPSURGE

U. S. intelligence sources report an unprecedented increase in Soviet strategic, long-range missile tests over the past several weeks. In July alone, the Soviets fired twenty-two missiles of various types, double the number of previous months, and three times more than the U. S. managed.

Included in the latest flurry of Soviet missile tests was the huge, land-based SS-19, each with six multiple warheads, or MIRV's, and capable of striking targets 6,300 miles away. Each of the SS-19's warheads is twice as big as those mounted on U.S. Minutemen ICBM's.

Another Soviet test involved a new, 3,500-mile submarine-launched ballistic missile never before flight-tested. And on July 2nd, the Russians fired eleven ballistic missiles from four different sites in about one hour. From three operational missile bases in the Soviet Union, the Soviets fired an SS-7, and SS-8, an SS-11 to the Kamchatka Peninsula—all in a two-minute period.

Only fifty minutes later, eight submarine-based SSN-6 rockets, the standard Soviet sub weapon, were fired at eight-second intervals....like a rapid-fire volley....from a submarine in the Sea of Japan.

American intelligence experts also report that a new Soviet land-based intermediate-range missile that could threaten Western Europe was tested in July for the ninth time without failure. This is the 2,400-mile range SSX20, which could become combat ready late this year. The SSX20 is the first intermediate-range ballistic missile armed with multiple warheads, and may soon be deployed on mobile launchers—unlike anything in the U.S. arsenal and difficult to detect.

There is also a question of just how far the recent Soviet missile developments violate the 1972 U.S.-Soviet strategic arms limitation treaty, SALT I, even as negotiations now continue for a permanent SALT II accord later this year.

Former Defense Secretary Melvin Laird says that the SS-19 deployment provides the Soviets with a 50 percent greater explosive capacity than with the SS-11 missiles they replace, and that this is in violation of the 1972 interim accord. Says Laird: "The Soviets have cheated on...the clear American understanding that neither side would appreciably increase the size of their intercontinental ballistic missiles."

Editor, The Journal:

Dear President Ford:

Do we want to sell Russia our wheat? On the surface you can't blame the farmers for wanting to do so. But really do we want to sell them anything and this includes factories, machinery, and many other things that we have sold them?

By 1933 Russia owed the U.S. 628 million dollars for goods sold to them, and after a few half-hearted attempts to collect this by President Roosevelt, we forgot the debt. This was a total loss, collecting nothing, no percentage of the dollar recovered.

Then during World War II we sold them 11 billion dollars worth of goods. After some negotiations they agreed to pay 722 million or about 6 percent of the total debt, but they requested 30 years to even do that. Then of that amount they have only paid 36 million dollars and it looks doubtful that we will get any more.

Now on this last 11 billion dollar sale we recovered 1/2 of a cent on the dollar. On the earlier indebtedness, we recovered nothing. I ask you is this selling? To me it looks more like an outright give away. Who paid for this? It was the tax payer!

I propose that if you and the Congress sell Russia anything more without cash, goods, or gold paid to us in advance, that you be charged and tried for malfeasance in office, negligence, and treason.
