10 YEARS AGO

Four more polio cases, three of them in one family, were diagnosed Monday by the Nyssa community's total to 24 and the county's total to 34 so far this season. Dr. Grant B. Hughes

county health officer, said that victims in the one family are all girls, 10, 12, and 14 years of age.

"Certainly our people are as healthy as the people in Ontario, Vale or elsewhere in the county," the health officer said this week. "What then, is the factor, or are they factors, that would account for this statistical difference?"

The health officer said that in his opinion a team of experts from the state board of health should investigate Malheur County and Nyssa in an effort to determine why the number of cases here is so large.

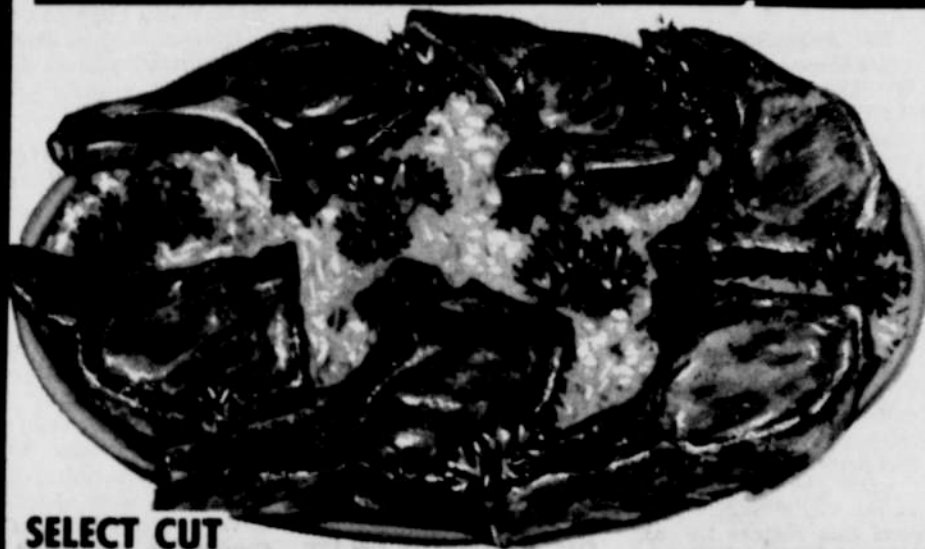

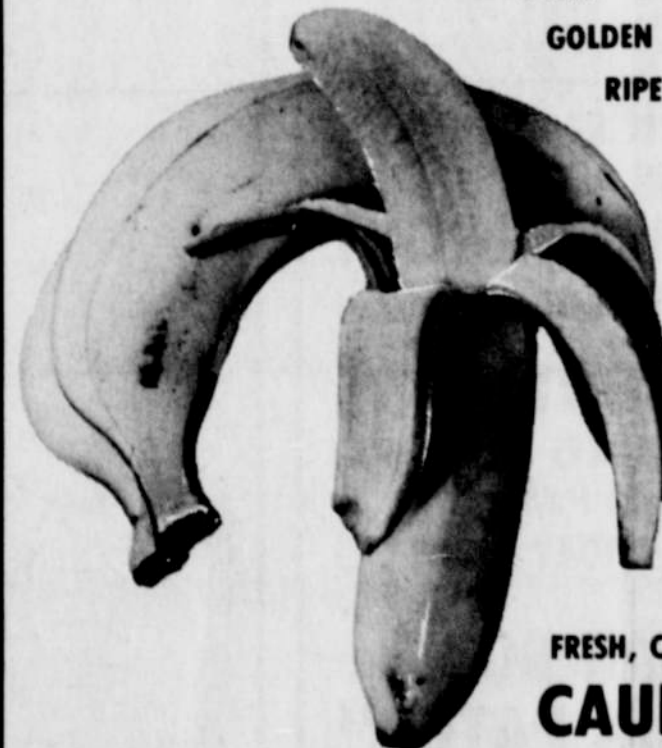
