Ontario's 7th annual Hospital Charity Ball will be held at the Elk's Lodge in Ontario, Saturday, November 15.

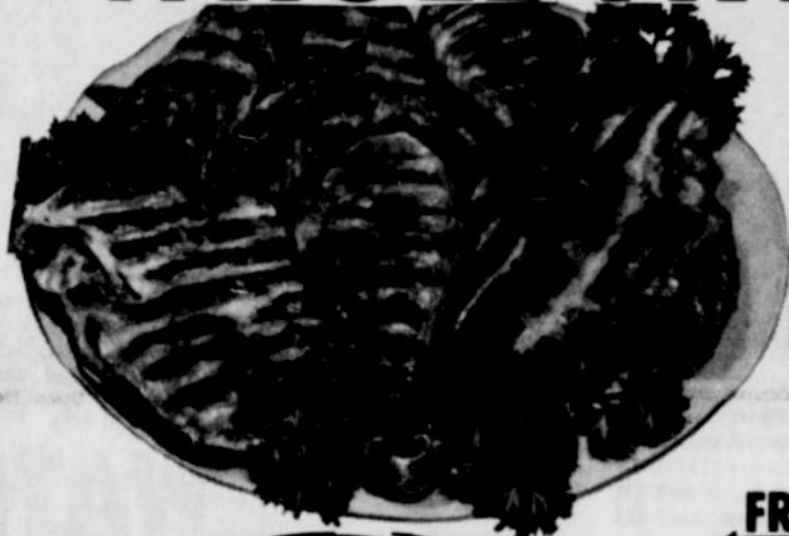
Music for dancing will be by the "Five Soft Sails" from 9 p.m. to 2 a.m. with breakfast being served at 11:30 p.m.
