The Malheur Memorial Hospital Auxiliary Fall Card Party will be held Saturday, November 8 at the Eagles Hall at 1:30 p.m.

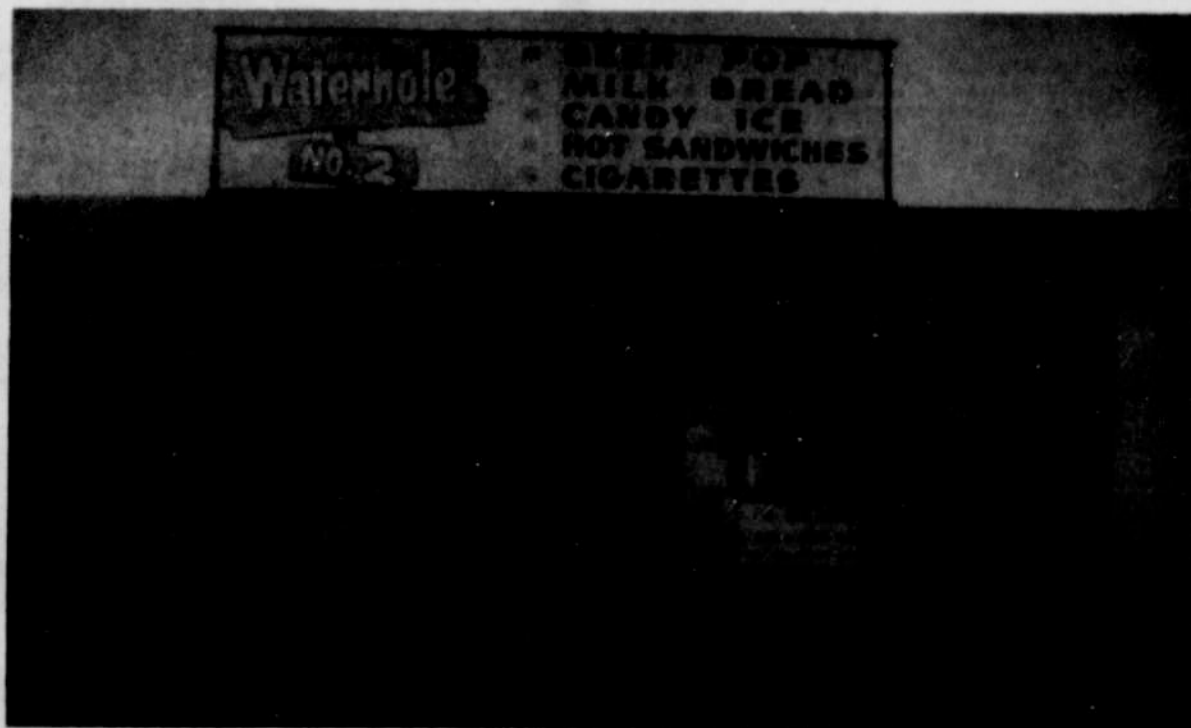
