### Advisory Board Tours District

Robert H. Skinner, Jordan Valley, and W. B. "Benny" Schlupe, Vale, were elected chairman and vice-chairman respectively of the newly formed multiple use advisory board of the Vale District, Bureau of Land Management which convened here Tuesday evening, October 14.

The meeting began with an intensive briefing of the Vale District, the BLM on a national level, and its place within the Department of the Interior. A tour of the district Wednesday and Thursday began in the Alkali Allotment north of Vale and continued through the central and southern parts of the district where stops were made at selected sites to view and discuss the various problems which confront the district.

### Oregon Traffic Toll Down For 1975

Chances are excellent that Oregon's traffic death toll for 1975 will be the lowest in about 11 years.

The Oregon Motor Vehicles Division reported today that deaths through October totaled 469—71 fewer than for the first ten months last year.

If the approximately 13 percent reduction holds up for the remaining two months of the year, officials said the 1975 death toll could be as low as 562. Oregon has not had a traffic toll below 600 since 1964 when 578 were killed.

The division said 45 deaths were reported to it in October, four more than for October a year ago but still one of the lowest October tolls in recent years.

What happens during the last two months of the year, particularly to pedestrians, will be critical in determining the final toll, officials said.

Last November and December 34 pedestrians were killed in Oregon traffic. If the pedestrian record improves and other traffic deaths remain about the same, a toll below 600 seems to be assured.

### Western Bank Earnings Increase

Nine month earnings released by Western Bank, Coos Bay, reveal a substantial increase over the same period a year ago.

A. W. "Bill" Sweet, president, Western Bank, announced net income of \$1.32 per share of common stock for the nine months ended September 30, 1975. This is up from net income of \$0.77 per share of common stock for the same nine month period in 1974.

Deposits increased over

\$17,000,000 during the twelve month period and combined with employee incentive programs and new expense controls to contribute to the improved earnings, according to Sweet.

Western Bank has 22 branches in Oregon and plans have been announced for a merger with Citizens Bank of Oregon, Eugene. The new bank will be called United Western Bank and be the fourth largest bank in Oregon.

### Rent Certificates No Longer Necessary

Landlords are no longer required to provide rent certificates for renters claiming property tax refunds, reports John J. Lobdell, Director of the Oregon Department of Revenue.

Lobdell says the 1975 Legislature dropped the requirement of the rent certificate. It is now the responsibility of the renters to provide accurate information

on the amount of rent paid during the year.

Lobdell says that renters must fill out a special part of the property tax refund claim form (70-R) with addresses, names of landlords, rental periods and rental charges.

Lobdell added that claims will be subject to audit by the revenue department staff, so persons claiming renter refunds should retain rental records for several years.

Claim forms and instructions will be part of the resident income tax packet to be mailed near the end of 1975.

**OANS**

According to Ag Director, Leonard Kunzman, Oregon could become Alaska's bread basket. Apparently businessmen there would like someone to compete with handlers in Seattle, the traditional shipping point since the gold rush. According to Kunzman, reciprocal trade with the 49th state probably will become a reality when the barges begin their Portland-Alaska runs in 1976.

Question: Shall the Council of the City of Adrian, Oregon, be authorized to acquire and construct a sewer system for the City; to issue and sell \$280,000 sewer bonds of the City to defray costs thereof; to impose and collect sufficient sewer and connection charges from users to provide revenues to pay interest and principal on bonds after paying all charges of costs of maintenance and operation of sewer system; to pledge sufficient revenues from sewer system to pay bonds and interest and provide special tax levy, if necessary, to pay principal of and interest on said bonds?

The polling place for the election will be the meeting room in the fire hall of the Adrian Rural Fire Protection District at Adrian, Oregon.

### INVITATION FOR BIDS

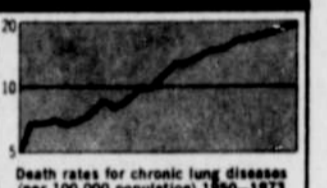
