was held at the Nyssa school gymnasium with five doctors on duty to give the shots. Each doctor had the assistance of 60 different people

for a total of more than 600 residents of the community being involved during the five-day program.

Dr. Grant B. Hughes, county health officer, said the number of polio cases in the county has risen to 41.

The state epidemiologist stated that recent cases indicate that polio might be spread by personal contact.

Back To School Breakfast

What a better way to send them off to school than with an energy-packed breakfast like **Cracked Wheat Pancakes**. This breakfast has the "staying power" to provide the all-morning energy children need to do well in school.

If you haven't cooked with Cracked Wheat, do try it. It's packed with body-building nutrients like protein, riboflavin, niacin, and thiamine.

Experiment! Use cracked wheat as an occasional substitute for potatoes, as a cooked cereal, or in any of your favorite recipes.

Cracked Wheat Pancakes

1 cup cracked wheat
 1 1/2 cups water
 2 cups flour
 2 teaspoons salt
 1 tablespoon baking powder
 2 tablespoons nonfat dry milk
 2 tablespoons sugar
 1/4 cup cooking oil
 2 cups water

Soak cracked wheat in 1 1/2 cups water for 2 hours or overnight. Drain, reserving liquor. (Do not use cooked cracked wheat as it makes gummy pancakes). Sift flour, salt, baking powder, dry milk, and sugar together. Add wheat and oil and stir. Add enough water to liquor to make 2 cups and stir only until batter is smooth. Drop by spoonfuls onto a hot greased pancake griddle or frying pan. Cook slowly until the pancake is covered with bubbles, turn and cook until bottom is well browned. Makes 20 (4") pancakes.
