Your County Agent Says

Imagine - A Plastic Queen Bee! Fool a bee? You bet! Scientists at OSU have determined that 25 cents worth of beeswax and a chemical compound fashioned into a false queen bee—works. In the lab the false queen bee idea works - Here's how they tell if the false queen is rejected. As bee's ovaries develop and the workers start to lay sterile eggs and begin queen replacement behavior then the rejection process is underway. The scientists feel if the process works in the field then a small "disposal hive" built around the false queen—could be used.

Bees as pollinators are important to the cherry, pear, apple, berry and legume seed business. The honey bee in Oregon produces three million pounds of commercial honey, annually. Alfalfa is pollinated mainly by leafcutter and alkali bees here in Malheur county but the honey bee plays an important role as a pollinator of many other crops in the area.

The Space Program—And Agriculture

Scientists have achieved a 97 percent accuracy in identifying crops and growing season progress as influenced by soil moisture or disease, when photographed with special film by special satellite.

The system can distinguish different types of vegetation that are distinctive for each class of objects on earth.

Crop diseases can be distinguished by different light patterns than normal plants.

How can this information be used? Well for one-it can be helpful in predicting or calculating yields. There are more.

So—the space program brings forth more "spin-off" information valuable to people world wide.
