Portland Rose Festival Enters Pasadena Parade

Continuing an old tradition, the Portland Rose Festival Association again will enter a float in the Pasadena New Years Day Tournament of Roses Parade, keeping Portland's place as the longest continuous participants in the parade from outside California.

Queen Heather VanWessem will be the float's lone rider. The Rose Festival hopes to repeat its success of last year, when the Portland entry won a major award, the National Trophy.

Although the float officially represents the Rose Festival, it also represents Portland and Oregon in the parade and is the state's only representation in the procession, according to Larry Campbell, Rose Festival president.

"This is the 40th year that the Rose Festival has provided this community and state with its only annual representation in this parade," said Campbell. "We believe that if this region intends to be a major tourist attraction, we need to be represented at Pasadena. Over a million Californians, our prime tourist market, and visitors, see the parade live. Millions more see it on world-wide television, providing us with a showcase that can't be duplicated anywhere else."

Accompanying Queen Heather to Pasadena will be President Campbell; Clayton Hannon, Rose Festival executive manager; Len Hufford prime minister of the Royal Rosarians, and their wives. The queen will also pay an official visit to Disneyland.

"Festivals U.S.A." is the Portland float theme. It depicts highlights of American history and symbols of our national heritage in a huge floral mural, 12 feet high and 130 feet in circumference. The word "America" is boldly overlaid on both sides of the unit in brilliant floral design.

For TV watchers, the Portland float is No. 26 in the line of march, about one-fifth of the way into the parade. The float just before Portland's is Rand McNally's "We the People."

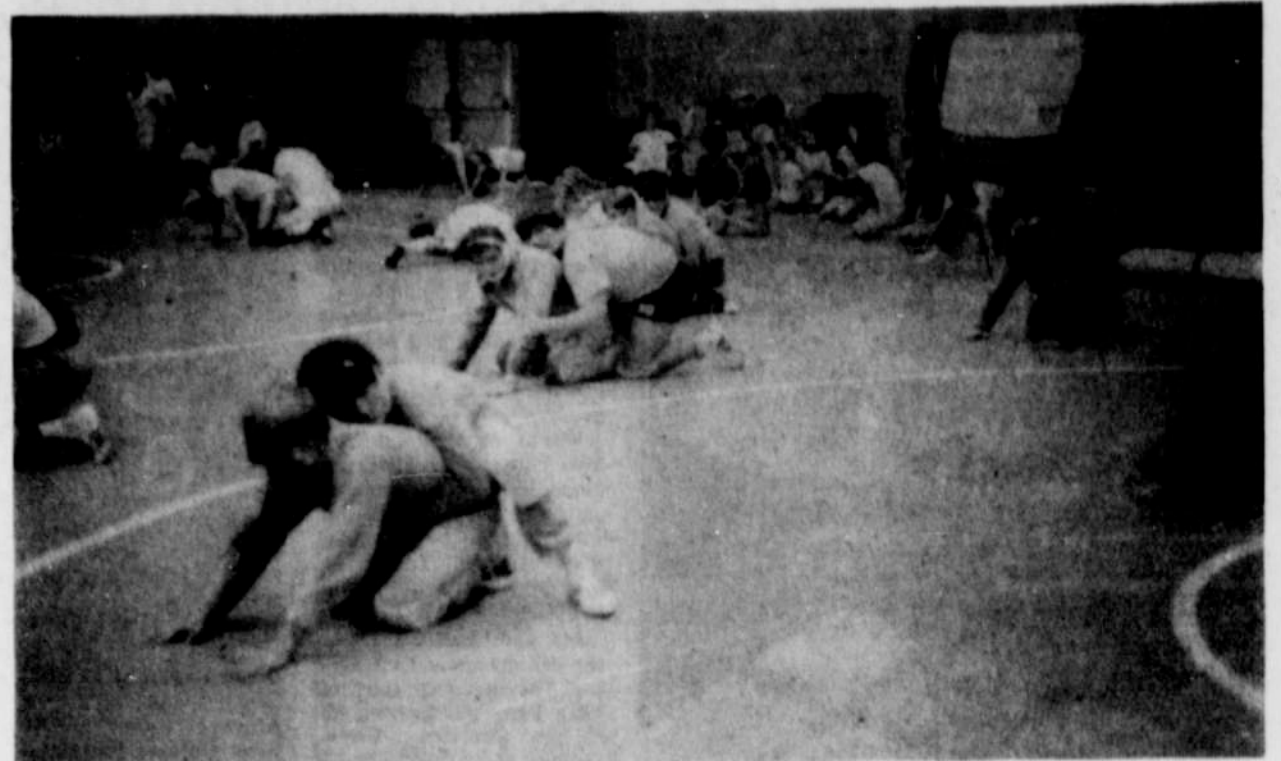

New Hunting And Fishing Licenses Needed In 1976

The Department of Fish and Wildlife reminds sportsmen that it's time to be thinking about new hunting and fishing licenses since 1975 licenses expire with the year at midnight on December 31. Waterfowl stamps, however, remain good through the remainder of the hunting season.

Hunting and angling licenses will cost more this year in accordance with new rates set by the 1975 Legislature. The new hunting license will cost \$7 and the angling license goes up to \$9. Those who buy the combination hunting and angling license at \$15 will save a dollar. The salmon-steelhead catch record or "punchcard" has gone up from \$1 to \$2. Both hunting and angling licenses for disabled veterans have gone up from 50 cents to \$1.

The cost of some big game tags has also been increased.

The deer tag has doubled in price and will cost \$4 next year. Elk tags have gone up to \$15. The bear tag will cost \$4.

This represents the first major increase in license fees since 1967 and, although the increases seem substantial, the Department of Fish and Wildlife says they only roughly keep up with the inflation that has taken place since then. In other words, the buying power available to put into wildlife management programs has not really increased with the license increase.

Nonresidents will also pay more for Oregon licenses and tags. The nonresident hunting license has gone up from \$50 to \$75 and nonresident tags will cost \$75 for elk, \$35 for deer, and \$35 for bear. The nonresident angling license took a smaller jump, increasing from \$20 to \$25 in 1976.
