Bicentennial Express Will Tour Oregon

The Bicentennial Express, a 45-foot highway semi-trailer, will visit 72 locations in Oregon starting March 12, carrying the story of the advance of humanity in Oregon with an exhibit provided by the Oregon Historical Society.

The free exhibit is funded and sponsored by the United States National Bank of Oregon, in cooperation with the historical society, the American Revolution Bicentennial Commission of Oregon, and the Oregon Trucking Associations, which will provide the trailer plus free transport of the trailer from one location to another.

The exhibit will be divided into five sections: Ancient Oregon, Indians of the Oregon country, westward expansion, early enterprise, and Oregon today. Artifacts on display will range from the Fort Rock sandal, approximately 9,000 years old and the earliest known remnant of mankind in Oregon, to computer output microfilm, latest "state of the art" development in business and financial reporting, which compresses 224 pages of computer printout into a single 4x6-inch film card without going through the printing process.

Among the many other items will be articles of Indian clothing and tools, belongings from the cabin of Captain Robert Gray, Captain Meriwether Lewis' branding iron, pioneer tools and equipment used in early Oregon business and professions, and the recently-completed Oregon quilt, which illustrates 30 scenes from Oregon history and geography.

First appearance of the Express will be at the U. S. Bank Plaza at S.W. Sixth Ave. and Oak Street in Portland, March 12 to 14.

The express will appear in Nyssa on October 5 and 6. The time and place will be announced later.

The schedule generally calls for the Express to be in northwest Oregon through early July, with an appearance July 2 to 4 in downtown Eugene, which will mark the actual bicentennial of the Declaration of Independence; in southern Oregon through July and early August; in eastern Oregon from early August through early October, and back in western Oregon for later in the fall. The single exception will be a three-day appearance at the Oregon State Fair in Salem September 3 to 5.
