

Oregon Dairy Princess To Be Selected In Portland

Twelve young ladies, representing every section of Oregon, will compete January 24-26 in Portland for Oregon Dairy Princess title. The contest finals will be held at the Jantzen Thunderbird Motor Inn.

Preliminary plans for the coronation have been completed, according to Ray Kozak, executive secretary of the Oregon Dairy Products Commission, which has sponsored the milk industry event for 17 years.

The event will culminate Monday afternoon, January 26, when a successor to reigning Oregon Dairy Princess Rhonda Forsyth of Eagle Point is selected by a three-member panel of judges.

Candidates for the 1976 title and the dairy areas they represent are: Debbie Griffiths, Central Oregon; Rebecca Droz, Clackamas County; Brenda Wall, Clatsop County; Tina Russell, Coos County; Deborah Fisher, Linn-Benton Counties; Cindy Osborn, Malheur County; Dena Mann, Marion County; Debra Kinkaid, Polk County; Patti Martin, Rogue Valley; Julie Gienger, Tillamook County; Sharon Hillecke, Washington County; Kristi Roberts, Yamhill County.

Judges for the event are Mrs. Elaine Scheeland of Portland, home service advisor for Portland General Electric Company; Roy Cordell of Eugene, executive vice president of Pacific Northwest Broadcasters, which operates radio station KPNW; and Mike Fairbourne, of Portland, KGW-TV meteorologist.

First National Bank of Oregon will award a \$400 educational continuance scholarship to the new princess in recognition of the importance of dairying to the economy of Oregon. It marks the fifth year the bank has participated in the event.

Other awards include a \$495 fashion and career scholarship from Glorcia La Vonne Finishing Fashion Modeling School.

The state title holder becomes a part-time employee of the Oregon Dairy Products Commission, receiving a salary and travel expenses to cover promotional activities across the state during the year of her reign.

Retiring Oregon Dairy Princess Rhonda Forsyth will receive a \$150 scholarship from the Oregon Dairy Wives organization.

The schedule of events calls for the princess candidates to convene as a group for orientation Saturday, January 24. Speeches for the competition will be given at a Sunday night banquet. Interviews with judges are planned throughout the weekend.

Coronation proceedings also include selection of first and second alternates, as well as Miss Congeniality.

He stated that last year the board received \$9,417.92 for 875 points, an increase over the 1973 Fair when \$9,142.52 was received for 859 points.

Capps said that \$374,000 was divided among the county fairs this year for a total of 29,638 points.

Fuel Consumption Rule-of-Thumb

The fuel consumption for a tractor in gallons per hour can be estimated for a gasoline tractor by multiplying the maximum PTO horsepower by .06. For a diesel tractor multiply the horsepower by .044. For example, a 100 horsepower gasoline tractor would use 6 gallons of gasoline per hour while a 100 horsepower diesel tractor would use 4.4 gallons per hour. This fuel consumption is average fuel consumption and would include both heavy loads and light loads. The rule-of-thumb is not applicable to tractors with hydrostatic drives.

CHEDDAR CHOWDER

- 2 cups boiling water
- 2 cups chopped potatoes
- 1/4 cup carrot slices
- 1/4 cup celery slices
- 1/4 cup chopped onion
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1/4 cup Parkay margarine
- 1/4 cup flour
- 2 cups milk
- 2 cups (8 ozs.) shredded Kraft sharp natural cheddar cheese
- 1 cup ham cubes

Combine water, vegetables and seasonings. Cover; simmer 10 minutes. Do not drain. Make a white sauce with margarine, flour and milk. Add cheese; stir until melted. Add ham and undrained vegetables. Heat; do not boil. 6 to 8 servings.

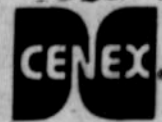
