



THE COAST GUARD ICEBREAKER
"Polar Star", the first new U.S. icebreaker to be built in over 20 years, cruises through Puget Sound on a pre-delivery shakedown cruise.

The 399-foot icebreaker, scheduled to be based in Seattle, will operate in both the Arctic and Antarctic regions assisting in resupply of military and scientific outposts.

Powered by a combined diesel/gas turbine propulsion system rated at a maximum of 60,000 horsepower, the new icebreaker is expected to be able to break through ice up to 21 feet thick. The ship was built by Lockheed Shipbuilding and Construction Company of Seattle.

FOR THE 14TH YEAR IN A ROW, Idaho Power Company this week released about 12,500 catchable-size rainbow trout in Oxbow Lake to give fishermen from far and near the sport to which they've become accustomed in the utility's Hells Canyon hydro development. The 10-12 inch rainbows, bought by Idaho Power from Clear Springs Trout Company, Buhl, and inspected by an Idaho Fish and Game Department pathologist before release, were put into the water at Wildhorse River beside the utility's McCormick Park.

Wendell Smith, Idaho Power environmental director, says the popular rainbow releases provide "excellent" fisheries in spring and fall, especially in Oxbow Lake but in Hells Canyon Lake and the Snake River below Hells Canyon Dam as well. Also in spring and fall, according to Smith, Coho salmon fishing has been "excellent" in Brownlee, Oxbow and Hells Canyon lakes, with fish weighing up to five pounds being taken. In summer, fishing for cat, crappie and bass also generally is "very good" in the development's three lakes, he says.
