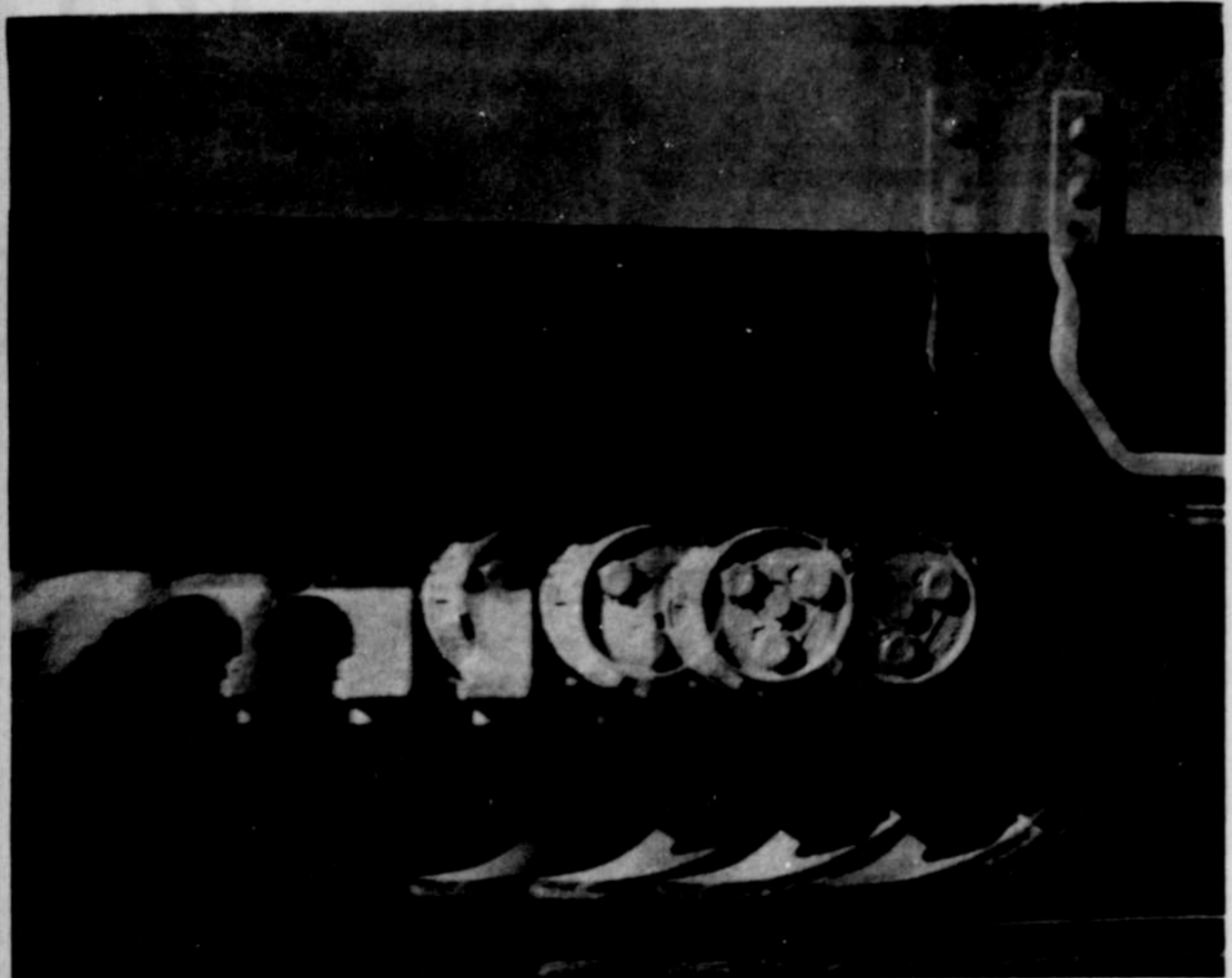

### Sculpture And Art Exhibit At TVCC

There will be an exhibit of sculpture, drawings and prints by Dmitri Hadzi and Hugh Townley, February 15 - 28 in the Library Gallery of the Treasure Valley Community College Weese Building. There will be an opening reception Sunday, February 15 from 2 to 4 p.m. Hugh Townley is Professor of Art at Brown University in Providence, Rhode Island. He has exhibited throughout the U. S. and Europe and has won many awards including the Rhode Island Governor's Award for the Arts. Dmitri Hadzi is from Rome and is currently in the United States as Guest Professor at Harvard. He is working on a major sculpture commission for the Federal Building in Portland, Oregon. Hadzi has exhibited world wide. His work has been shown and is in the collections of such museums as the Guggenheim and the Museum of Modern Art in New York, the National Gallery of Art and the Corcoran in Washington, D. C., the National Gallery in Rome, the Art Institute of Chicago, the Tate Gallery and the National Gallery in London, the Tel Aviv Museum of Art, the San Francisco Museum of Art, the Montreal Museum of Fine Arts, the Los Angeles County Museum and the Museo del Prado in Madrid. Both artists were among six sculptors invited to be part of the Oregon International Sculpture symposium sponsored by the National Endowment for the Arts and the Oregon Arts Commission in 1974. This exhibit was brought to Oregon through the effort of Nancy Kem of the Kem Gallery in Bend and has traveled throughout the state. It has recently been on exhibit at the Rogue Gallery in Medford and the Portland Art Museum.
