Bull Sale Set For Feb. 28

Eighty-four bulls will start parading before the veterinary and grading committee Friday, February 27 at 1:00 p.m. in preparation for the sale February 28 at the Malheur County Fairgrounds in Ontario, according to George Bain, County Extension Agent.

The veterinarian this year will be Chad Clark of Payette. The grading committee is Bill Ross, Jordan Valley; Albert Wolfkiel, Meridian and John Henry, Caldwell.

All bulls must be between 18 months and 30 months of age and are required to be sound and grade B or better, Bain says.

The auction starting at 1 p.m., February 28 in Girvin Hall will be cried by Clayton Tschirgi and Associates.

It is expected these bulls will be purchased by operators in Western Idaho and

Eastern Oregon. So each bull will be accompanied with health papers so they can be transported anywhere in this area.

This is the biggest sale of its kind in the area, says Bain, and attracts a large number of producers from as far north as Grangeville and south to Nevada.

Bull quality has been improving each year. This year is expected to be no exception, Bain concludes.
