

## Kathryn Kunkel Named Betty Crocker Winner

Kathryn Kunkel has been named Nyssa High School's 1976 Betty Crocker Family Leader of Tomorrow. The student won the honor by scoring high in a written knowledge and attitude examination administered to high school seniors here and throughout the country Dec. 2. The Family Leader will receive a certificate from General Mills, sponsor of the annual Betty Crocker Search for Leadership in Family Living and becomes eligible for state and national honors.

From the ranks of all school winners in the state, a State Family Leader of Tomorrow is selected through judging centered on test performance and receives a \$1,500 college scholarship. The second-ranking student in the state will receive a \$500 scholarship. Encyclopaedia Britannica Educational Corporation will present "The Annals of America," a 20-volume reference work, to the state winner's school.

Representing every state and the District of Columbia, the 51 Betty Crocker Family Leaders of Tomorrow, to-

gether with their faculty advisors, will gather in Washington, D.C., in April for an expense-paid educational tour of the capital city. During the tour, personal observations and interviews are conducted to select the All-American Family Leader of Tomorrow, who receives a \$5,000 college scholarship. Second, third and fourth place national winners receive scholarships increased to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000, respectively.

## Adrian Schools Adopt Milk, Lunch Policy

The Adrian Public School District today announced its policy for free and reduced price meals and free milk for children unable to pay the full price of meals and milk served under the National School Lunch, School Breakfast, and Special Milk Programs.

Local school officials have adopted the following family size income criteria for determining eligibility:

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals or free milk. In addition, families not meeting these criteria but with other unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply.

Application forms are available at the school district superintendent's office and at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals and milk for them, it should contact the school.

Under the provisions of the policy the school board chairman will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an

informal basis. If he wishes to make a formal appeal, he may make a request either orally or in writing to Emery Cameron, Box 165, Adrian, Oregon Phone 372-2146 for hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

If a family member becomes unemployed or if family size changes, the family should contact the school to file a new application. Such changes may make the children of the family eligible for reduced price meals, or for additional benefits such as free meals and milk if the family income falls at or below the levels shown above.

In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, or national origin.

Each school and the office of the superintendent has a copy of the complete policy which may be reviewed by any interested party.

## Top Warm Wheat Germ Cobbler With Ice Cream

### Wheat Germ Cherry Cobbler for Quick Cooks

Wheat germ cherry cobbler is an up to date version of a favorite homemade dessert. It has the tender biscuit crust and juicy fruit filling you would expect to find in a good old fashioned cobbler. And it's absolutely luscious served warm and fragrant from the oven with a topping of ice cream or whipped cream. What's the difference then?

### WHEAT GERM CHERRY COBBLER

1 1/2 cups biscuit mix  
1 cup vacuum packed wheat germ (reg.)  
1/4 cup sugar  
1/2 teaspoon ground cardamom  
1/4 cup butter, softened  
1/4 cup shortening  
1 (1-pound 5-ounce) can cherry pie filling  
1 teaspoon water  
Whipped cream or ice cream

Mix biscuit mix, wheat germ, sugar and cardamom. Cut in butter and shortening to make a dough. Pat 3/4 of dough into 9-inch square baking pan. Cover with cherry filling. Add water to remaining dough mixing lightly with fork. Shape into 5 narrow ropes. 1 (14-inch); 2 (7-inch); 2 (4-inch). Flute ropes by pinching with fingertips as for pie edge. Place long rope on top of filling diagonally from corner to corner. Arrange remaining ropes parallel on either side (not criss cross). Bake in 350 deg. oven 30 to 35 minutes or until crust is golden brown. Cut into squares or spoon into dessert dishes. Top with whipped cream or ice cream. Makes 8 or 9 servings.

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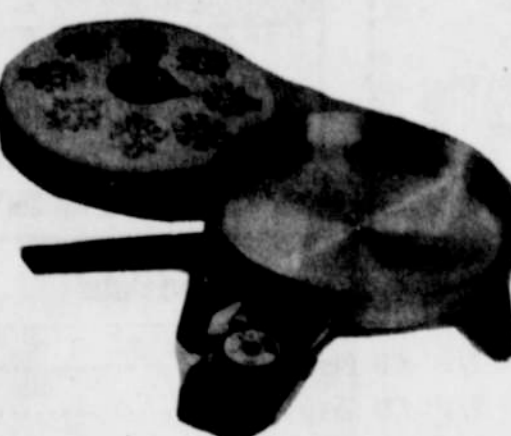
