BASIC OVEN MEATBALLS

Prepare meatballs and freeze. Then use frozen meatballs as a shortcut in preparing a variety of recipes.

3 beaten eggs

4 cup milk

3 cups soft bread crumbs (about 41/2 slices) 1/2 cup finely chopped onion

2 teaspoons salt

3 lbs. ground beef

Advance preparation:

In large mixing bowl combine beaten eggs, milk, bread crumbs, chopped onion, and salt; add beef and mix well. Shape into 6 dozen 1 inch balls. Place half of the meatballs in 151/x101/x21/4 inch baking pan. Bake at 375 deg. for 25-30 minutes. Remove from pan and cool; repeat with remaining meatballs. Place cooled meatballs on cookie sheet; freeze firm. Using 24 meatballs per package, wrap meatballs in moisture-vapor material. Seal and label. Makes 6 dozen.

Sauerbraten Meatballs

1 cup pineapple juice

1/4 cup water 2 beef bouillon cubes

1/2 cup coarse gingersnap crumbs

1/3 cup brown sugar

1/4 cup raisins 2 tablespoons lemon juice

Hot cooked rice

In saucepan bring pineapple juice, water, and bouillon cubes to boiling. Add gingersnap crumbs, brown sugar, raisins, and lemon juice; cook and stir to dissolve gingersnaps. Add frozen meatballs. Cover and simmer until meatballs are thawed, 15 to 20 minutes; stir occasionally. Serve over hot rice. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

The Metric System
