A NYSSA LANDMARK SINCE IT WAS COMPLETED IN December, 1928, the old elementary gymnasium will be torn down next week to make way for a new multi-purpose gym and recreation

The old gym was built by Godfrey Johansen, Big Bend contractor, at a cost of \$6,000. A classroom section was added on in 1934 after the high school fire. and the playing floor was later extended into that

The elementary school will hold a Bicentennial Assembly Friday morning at 9 a.m., the final affair in the 48-year-old structure. Next week R. A. Chambers and Associates of Eugene will start demolishing the building to make way for the new building, at a contract cost of \$589,532.

Voters Reject TVCC Budget PTA Dinner

Voters in the Treasure Valley Community College district defeated the proposed operating budget in Tuesday's election by nearly 500 votes. A complete but unofficial

count shows 1,141 yes votes to 1,638 no votes, with only the three Ontario precincts approving the budget. College directors had as-

ked the voters to approve an operating budget that amoun ted to \$946,751, including revenue considered uncollectable from taxpayers.

The budget would have required a tax rate of \$2.88 per thousand at current

Voting by precincts has Ontario No. one with 164 yes votes and 99 no; Ontario two, yes, 164 no; Pioneer school, 23 yes, 116 no; Cairo school, 91 yes, 129 no; Nyssa, 161 yes, 328 no; Vale, 96 yes, 320

Willowcreek had 17 yes, 92 no; Adrian, 26 yes, 93 no; Harper, 10 yes, 47 no; Annex, 11 yes, 18 no; and Huntington, 40 yes, 47 no with a total turnout of 2,779.

Emery Skinner, president of the college, expressed disappointment in the outcome of the election.

He said the next time the college can present a budget to the people will be the fourth Tuesday in May (May 25). Whether or not they can time is unknown. The budget board and the college board will now need to begin work 225 yes, 185 no; Aiken 277 on a new proposal, he said.

School Board, Teachers Reach Salary Agreement

The Nyssa school board reached salary settlement with the teachers, and signed a contract for two years. The settlement for the 1976-77 school year was based on 6.8% increase on the average teachers salary. A new teacher with a B.A. degree will receive \$9425 next year.

The following year's salary will be based on the National Cost of Living Index from January to January.

Derryl Leggett represented the teachers on the Negotiating Committee, and Gene Stunz was the school board will settle with the Classified employes at a later date.

Superintendent W. L. Mc-Partland said that Tom Moore has filed a nominating petition for the school board for Position No. 5. Others running for this position are Duane Drydale and Adrianna Kunkel. The incumbent, Victor Haburchak, is not running for re-election. Deadline for filing is March 15, for the April 20 election.
