10 YEARS AGO

20 YEARS AGO

A community project for Main Street got underway last week with the razing of two out-dated buildings preparatory to construction of a free customer parking lot at the corner of Main and North Second Street.

Twenty Nyssa business firms have so far contributed or pledged funds to lease the 60 by 120 lot for one year for the purpose of providing parking space for their customers.

The property now being renovated is owned by Mrs. Wilton Ferguson of Milton-Freewater who is removing an abandoned service station and has made arrangements to give a small dwelling on the property to the Nyssa Girl Scouts for a club house. The service station was operated by George Blunk. The dwelling on the back lot facing Second has been used as an ice building and a home at various times.

30 YEARS AGO

Artie Robertson, who has completed 25 years of service as a regular rural carrier of Nyssa has seen the territory covered by his route develop from a sagebrush covered terrain to a productive area that is providing the farmers and other residents of the vicinity with an abundant living.

When Mr. Robertson started carrying mail March 7, 1921 all of the land north of the Owyhee Dam road and west of the Shoestring Ditch was covered with sagebrush. At that time there was only one route out of Nyssa.

Robertson has driven an average of 15,000 miles a year or a total of 375,000 miles.

The veteran carrier, who has covered the same route during all of the 25 years, will have earned his retirement in five more years.

40 YEARS AGO

Charles Overstreet has leased the old Idanha Orchard place of 120 acres and will farm it during the coming season. He has rented his

The Idanha Orchard, one of the famous orchards of the entire Snake River Valley was planted over 35 years ago and for years gave work to a large number of fruit workers and produced many carloads of fruit. Of late years the owners have been pulling trees and during the past winter the entire orchard was pulled out. Pulling was completed this week; and the Idanha Orchard passes into history.

W.L. Walker, realtor from Atlantic, Iowa, who may bring a hundred Iowa families in to Malheur County in the near future, spent last week here checking up on lands open to homestead entry, and listing farms under the Warm Springs that await homeseekers. Mr. Walker is the second promoter who has been sent to this section to obtain land data for a large number of homeseekers, who are looking toward Oregon and particularly Malheur County.

General agriculture never had a brighter outlook in Malheur County than it has now, is in the opinion of a local banker. An abundant supply of irrigation water is assured the farmers through the upper country and a large surplus is assured farmers on the Warm Springs project. The real import of this country is just beginning to be realized.
