Oregon Trail Grange

During the Lecturer's program, members were entertained by Loyd and Iva Adams who gave a report on the early history of the area. Adams reported that the first water right was issued in 1882. By 1884, six miles of ditch had been built. The first country school was built in 1901 and W. H. Adams, Loyd's uncle helped organize the school district.

In 1912, the Shoestring ditch was built. Going to the Fair in Ontario, in a wagon over dirt roads, was an adventure. One of the pleasures was walking on the board sidewalk built by the city of Ontario for use of Fair goers.

Mrs. Adams gave a description of Nyssa when the Wilson ditch went through the center of town. Reib's Market is located on a spot that once was a part of the deep ditch. Many changes have taken place since Nyssa's main street was only two block long. The population in 1936 was about 800 hardy souls.

Frank Sherwood, another area pioneer, added more historical facts. Frank was also host for the evening and served the refreshments to the 19 members present. Mr. and Mrs. Ted Avery, Big Bend Grange and Carl Linegar, Morning Star Grange were welcome visitors.
