Navy Machinist's Mate First Class Alan E. Cottle, son of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Cottle of 107 North 5th St., Nyssa, is taking part in a five-nation naval exercise off the California coast as a crewmember of the frigate USS Enterprise.

Named "Valiant Heritage" to commemorate America's Bicentennial, the exercise involves 41 ships, 200 aircraft and more than 18,000 men.

The eleven-day exercise, including forces from Australia, Canada, New Zealand, the United Kingdom and the U. S., is designed to test the ability of the allied navies in joint operation. The maneuvers will include missile firings at the Pacific Missile Test Center, Point Mugu, California, carrier operations, underway replenishment, communications and gunnery tests.

A 1965 graduate of Nyssa High School, he joined the Navy in March 1970.

Daily Patterning Schedule Gives Hope To Ulrey Family

If I were to ask you what the word "patterning" means I would probably receive many answers from something you sew by, or copy from, to something you buy out of a big book in the store.

In the Floyd Ulrey home, this word means HOPE most of all, but they know it means "A technique in which the limbs of a brain-injured patient are manipulated to imitate the crawling or creeping motions of a normal five-month old baby."

Larry Ulrey is not five months old, but seven years old. He is blind, cannot stand or walk, has never crawled and cannot speak. He was born with a metabolism imbalance relating to blood sugar which caused a coma. The coma, in turn resulted in severe brain damage.

The objective of patterning is not to train muscles, but to tutor or teach the brain to direct muscles. The damaged area of the brain contains millions of healthy cells and this patterning is aimed at educating those cells to take over the jobs of the dead cells. Once crawling is established, other normal

activities might develop in natural order.

The Ulreys have seen several medical specialists, enrolled their son at the Mary Kay School in Ontario, and were told at each place "You're doing all you can for your son." "All," has always been an untold amount of tender loving care, constant supervision and the everyday searching for some sign of improvement.

Recently they returned from the Utah Institute for Neurological Development and were told perhaps patterning will help. There is no guarantee that it will, but if there is even the slightest chance this will help Larry, this devoted family is willing to try.

This may sound simple, but here is the hard part: Larry must be put through these basic crawling patterns four times a day, six days a week. The Ulreys, from dad and mom on down, can manage all of this with the exception of one hour per day.

Mrs. Ulrey says, "We do need help so very badly and any adult, teen-ager, mo-

thers with toddlers, great-grandmothers, teachers, high-schoolers, or anyone who can and will come to our house one hour each day (this doesn't necessarily have to be the same person each day) to help us to help Larry, will be doing us a great service."

There are several communities in the United States that have joined with many people to come and help pattern brain injured children. Can't we as home town people (surely there are some of us that could spare a little time) donate our time to this little boy who is totally unable to help himself? Wouldn't it be a great miracle, if through our many efforts he showed some improvement? Wouldn't it be a test of faith to see the joy on his mother's face and hear the echo of his brothers and sisters, "I knew he could get better if we helped him." Wouldn't you like to see all this happen? It can possibly if we help and do it right now.
