Freezer Meals

Pressed for time? Giving the family a nutritious and tasty meal when time is short is difficult for most homemakers. Cooking ahead, when time is available, and freezing relieves the strain.

BASIC STEW MIXTURE

Prepare this stew mixture in quantity and freeze. Then use it to prepare any of the following recipes, or for your favorite stew.

1/2 cup shortening
5 pounds beef for stew, cut in 1 1/2 inch cubes
4 cups water
2 cups chopped onion
2 cloves garlic, minced
1 tsp. salt

Advance preparation: Melt shortening in Dutch oven. Brown a portion of the beef on all sides in the hot shortening. Remove browned beef from Dutch oven; set aside. Repeat browning until all beef is cooked. Return all of the beef to the Dutch oven. Add water, chopped onion, minced garlic, and salt. Bring to boiling. Simmer, covered, until meat is tender, about 1 1/2 to 2 hours. Cover and refrigerate. When cold, skim fat from surface. Pour stew mixture into three 1-quart freezer containers. Seal, label, and freeze. Makes 3 quarts.

BEEF PIE

1/2 recipe frozen Basic Stew Mixture (1 quart)
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
1 teaspoon liquid gravy base
1 (10 oz.) package frozen peas and carrots
2 tablespoons snipped parsley
1/4 cup all-purpose flour
1 package refrigerated buttermilk biscuits (10 biscuits)
In saucepan combine stew, 1/2 cup water, salt, and gravy base. Cover and cook over low heat until thawed, about 20 minutes. Add peas and carrots, and parsley. Cover and simmer until tender, about 5 minutes. Blend flour and 1/2 cup water; stir into stew. Cook and stir until thick. Pour into a 2-quart baking dish. Cut 7 biscuits in half; place atop hot stew. Bake at 450 deg. for 20 to 25 minutes. (Bake remaining biscuits.) Makes 5 or 6 servings.

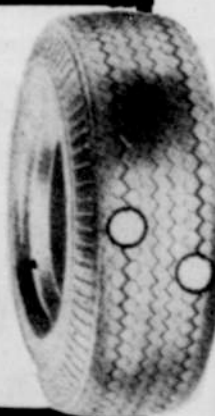
