10 YEARS AGO

30 YEARS AGO

The aid of Mexican nationals and German prisoners of war to supplement the farm labor shortage will be requested for the 1946 crop season by the Malheur County Farm Labor Sponsoring association.

The tentative schedule for prisoners of war calls for a total of 800 to be divided between camps at Nyssa and Vale. It is the tentative arrangement to house 550 at Nyssa and 250 of the prisoners at Vale.

The sponsoring organization went on record as desiring a total of 750 Mexican nationals for use in the county. It was agreed to house 200 Mexicans at Ontario, 250 at Adrian and farmhouse the remaining 300.

40 YEARS AGO

Lands under the Vale and Owyhee projects will be

thrown open to homestead entry in the next few weeks, the Bureau of Reclamation announces. On the Owyhee project, 6,190 acres will be divided into 105 public land farms units, each with sufficient irrigable area to support a family, and will be opened shortly. Twenty-nine public land farm units of a total area of 1,529 acres on the Vale project will also be opened soon.

Upon homesteading one of these farms the settler assumes his proportionate share of the project's obligation to the Government, which is to repay the cost of the irrigation works. Construction charges against the involved in the Owyhee and Vale projects averages about \$165.

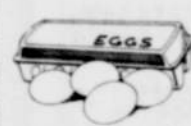
