



Fresh Dairy Foods Go Into Tempting Entree

Fabulous cheese roulade makes impressive party entree

Here's a smashing idea for a festive luncheon or spring dinner entree. It's called Fran's Cheese Roulade and it tastes something like a fluffy filled omelette or cheese souffle. This, however, is put together jelly roll fashion. It's baked and sliced to show off a handsome filling of creamy cheese and chicken. The idea for this comes from something we sampled in a little restaurant tucked away on the Oregon coast. Here we've worked out a six portion recipe you can make successfully at home for your own entertaining. Generous amounts of milk, butter and cheese contribute to the delightful fresh flavor that's so very appealing. Complete the menu with fresh asparagus, petite rolls and butter.

FRAN'S CHEESE ROULADE

6 tablespoons butter
1/2 cup flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 cups milk
4 eggs, separated
Cheddar or Sour Cream Chicken Filling
Grated parmesan cheese

Line greased 15 x 10-inch jelly roll pan with waxed paper or foil. Grease and flour paper. Melt butter. Stir in flour and salt. Blend in milk. Cook, stirring, until mixture thickens and comes to boil. Remove from heat. Stir in egg yolks, one at a time. Whip egg whites until stiff. Fold into batter. Spread in jelly roll pan. Bake in 300 deg. oven 45 minutes or until lightly browned. Cool 15 to 45 minutes in pan. Spoon filling in strip along center of roulade. Loosen edges of roulade with knife. Roll roulade over filling, using waxed paper underneath to help roll. Form a tight roll, seam side down on pan. Remove paper. Sprinkle generously with parmesan cheese. Bake uncovered in 350 deg. oven 20 to 30 minutes or until heated through. Cut into thick slices. Makes 6 servings.

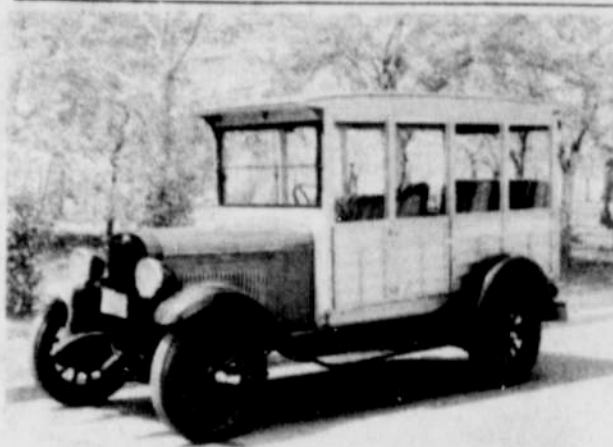

FIFTY YEARS OF CHEVY 'WOODIES'—Over the years, the "Woody" station wagon has come in many shapes, sizes and exteriors, and it continues to grow in popularity whatever the kind of wood finish. More than 50 years of woody wagon history and development are represented in these four Chevrolet vehicles. One of the early versions was the 1920 Chevrolet (top left). In those days the wagon lover bought a chassis and had the wood body installed at a custom shop.

The first factory-made woody was the 1939 Chevrolet at bottom left, and it boasted hand-crafted birch and ash wood finish. Chevrolet came out with the first steel-bodied wagon in 1949 (top right) with application of decals simulating mahogany panels. A favorite woody version among today's passenger car offerings is the luxurious 1976 Chevrolet Caprice Estate station wagon (bottom right), featuring vinyl wood-grain exterior.
