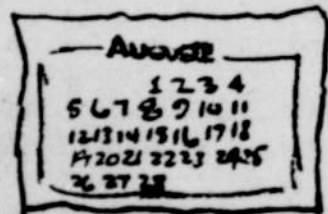
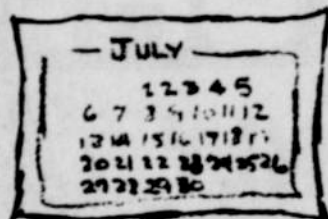

Yraguen Named On Juvenile Committee

Frank Yraguen, Malheur County district attorney has accepted appointment to the Oregon Legislature's Juvenile Advisory Committee.

Joint announcement of Yraguen's appointment was made by Harlow Lenon, judge of the Multnomah County Circuit Court, who is juvenile advisory committee chairman, and State Senator Elizabeth Browne, chairman of the Legislative Interim Committee on the Judiciary.

Senator Browne's legislative committee is undertaking revision of the laws relating to juveniles with particular emphasis on Oregon's juvenile code. This study and revision are being done under a grant from the Oregon Law Enforcement Council.

Yraguen was invited to join an advisory committee "composed of experts on juvenile law, persons whose professions bring them into contact with juveniles on a day-to-day basis, and other citizens with a special concern for young people."

"The judiciary committee is attempting to formulate a new law which protects the rights of children and their parents, while still making it possible to provide care and services to those children

who need assistance," according to Senator Browne.

Yraguen attended the advisory committee's first meeting Saturday at the State Capitol building in Salem. A half-dozen meetings will be held before September to assist Senator Browne's committee in its work.

Yraguen joins a 14-member juvenile advisory committee, comprised of Circuit Court Judges, juvenile counselors, law enforcement, children's services workers, and educators. He is a candidate for Circuit Judge.
