Wild Horses Roam East Oregon Areas

Thirteen wild horse herds are in the Vale Bureau of Land Management district, but only three are in areas generally reachable by the public, although not by passenger car.

BLM officials said the area nearest to the cities of Vale, Ontario and Nyssa is Three Finger Rock, a landmark.

There are two ways to reach this area, both on rough roads after leaving the highway. The longer way is to drive into Leslie Gulch about five miles from the Succor Creek-Leslie Gulch junction. Turn north (right), go through the first cattle-guard and you are in wild horse country.

The alternate route is to drive about three miles on

the Succor Creek road out of Adrian, then turn right. Stay on this main road about 14 miles until you reach crested wheat grass seeding. Take the left road at the fork and stay on this secondary road about 12 miles.

This is wild horse herd area. There are 200 horses in this particular area, officials said. Binoculars will help you spot the horses when they are on the ridgetops where they most often are seen.

The largest herd of wild horses, 1,400 head, roam the Barren Valley-Sheephead Mountains area. To get there, go through Jordan Valley to Burns Junction, turn south on Highway 95, drive three miles and then turn right (west).

Travel on this road some 15 miles into Sheephead Mountains and return by the same route. Once you turn off the highway, you will be in wild horse country.

Occasionally, some of the horses can be seen quietly grazing adjacent to the highway south of Burns Junction. The Barren Valley-Sheephead Mountains area will give you your best opportunity to see wild horses.

The third reachable area is Cold Springs. Here a herd of 200 horses roam. Drive to Harper, turn south on Crowley road until you get to Skull Springs. A small, old cabin there will help identify it.

Continue south on this road another four miles, turn

right (west), continue for another two miles, turn left another two miles until you reach a deadend. Horse country is that area of Skull Springs southward.

Wild horse herds normally are of two types. One of them will be a stallion with his string of mares and colts. In the other group are the bachelor studs, obvious by their lack of mares and young ones.

BLM officials remind there is no guarantee of seeing horses. A suggestion is to stop in at the BLM office in Vale and pick up a map to go with the directions.

If you do see the horses, you are advised to shut off your motor immediately and be as quiet as possible. If you
