Sugarbeet Growers Receive Payment

Sugarbeet growers in the Nampa, Nyssa, and Mountain Home areas of Idaho and Oregon received checks totaling \$1.7 million from the Amalgamated Sugar Company last week.

The Nampa/Nyssa payments amounted to approximately \$1.5 million, while the Mountain Home payments were just over \$200,000.

"The beet payment is made at this time according to the terms of the contract between the company and growers in the areas just mentioned," reported Agriculture Vice President Henry Zobell. He went on to explain that all growers contracting with the company received a total of \$44 million in November 1975 as the initial payment for the 1975 crop. The final payment for 1975 sugarbeets will be made in October after the company closes its fiscal year in September.

In making this spring payment, Zobell added that the consumption of sugar in the U.S. in recent weeks has improved significantly and is

approaching levels which existed prior to the abrupt decline caused by the extremely high sugar prices in late 1974.

As a consequence of this improved demand for sugar, sugar prices may have halted their prolonged downward movement of last year.

Why I Walked In The Walkathon

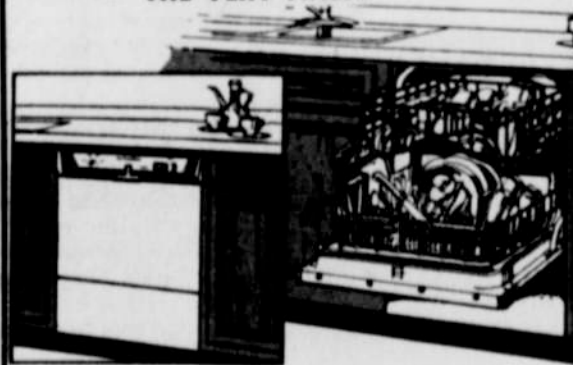

I made \$284.81. I got a calculator for it. I had 64 sponsors. I earned a watch for having the most sponsors.

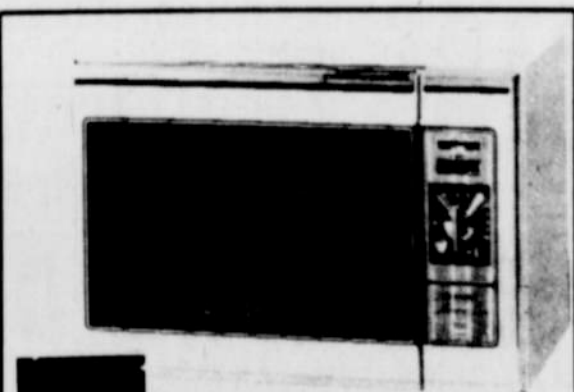
