Finals of Organ Festival Set For Monday

The finals of the Snake River Valley Yamaha Electric Organ Festival are set to take place Monday, May 10, 6:30 p.m. at the TVCC Weese Building in Ontario. The public is invited and admission is free.

Nearly 30 local organists will be performing. Winners of each of the five divisions will receive expense paid trips to Lake Tahoe where they will compete June 4, 5, and 6 in Regional Competition for top honors that will lead them on to the National Competition in Chicago.

The local Festival is sponsored by Frontier Music of Ontario. Mrs. Wanda Lehmkuhl, coordinator, has announced that there will be five judges including Miss Debbie Culbertson of Hood River who was in Ontario earlier this spring for an Organ concert. Miss Culbertson was winner of the Regional Competition the past two years in the Professional Division.

Other judges for the Festival include Mr. Dick Dalzell, Music Director at TVCC, Ontario; Mrs. Gary Nelson, Instructor of Organ, Boise; Mr. Leon Graviet, Choral Director, Emmett; and Mr. Paul Bicknese, Band Director, Fruitland.

Master of Ceremonies for the musical event is Mr. Eric McKaig, local radio personality. Mr. McKaig will interview each of the participants after their performance.

In all Divisions except Hobbyist Division, each participant will perform a prepared number, possibly their own arrangement, as well as an Improvisation on a Theme that they will have only ten minutes to prepare.

The Hobbyist division includes organists over 25 who enjoy playing for their own enjoyment. Hobbyists will perform prepared numbers, several playing their own arrangements.

Bob Jackson Named New OEA President

Bob Jackson, 36, a Bend junior high school teacher, was elected president-elect of the Oregon Education Association.



Balloting took place at the OEA representative assembly which began last Thursday at the Sheraton Motor Hotel in Portland. The association represents more than 20,000 Oregon teachers.

Jackson will be president-elect, the equivalent of vice president, from July of this year to July of 1977. Then he will assume the presidency automatically the following year.

He will be required to take a one-year leave of absence from his geography and English teaching post at Pilot Butte Junior High in order to serve as the group's president. He will also move to Tigard that year, where the OEA has its headquarters.

Jackson is in his seventh year with the Bend district. He has taught in Myrtle Creek and in Parma, Idaho. He is a graduate of Northwest Nazarene College in Nampa, and holds a masters degree in education from the University of Oregon. He and his wife Nelda, are known to many in Nyssa, Apple Valley, and Parma areas, as she is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dwight Seward of Apple Valley.

Sprays for the Veterans graves will be made Saturday May 22 at the home of Eleanor Browne at 10 a.m.

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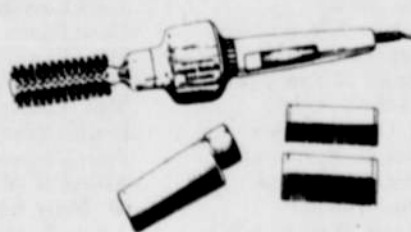
