The event is to be sponsored by the Treasure Valley Association for Handicapped and Retarded Citizens and TORCH, the teen organization which assists the retarded, and proceeds will aid the retarded of the area.

According to Richard Rebbe, president of TVA-HRC, the benefit event also has national and state association sponsorship. Proceeds from the pledges go to finance numerous local projects which aid the less fortunate. Projects, he said, include pre-school programs, group homes, activity centers sheltered employment facilities and care facilities which allow parents a safe place to leave their children for brief periods.

Nationally and statewide, the funds derived from Hike-Bike assist in supporting the processes which have brought retardation out of the backwards of the institution.

The state Association for Retarded Citizens works through public education, parent counseling and state and national lawmaking processes to accomplish its goals, he said.

Nyssa hikers and bikers will register at Rodriguez Bakery on North Third Street at 8:30 a.m., Saturday morning, May 15. The 25 mile round trip will be to Onatrio and back, with lunch in Ontario.
