Inflation-Fighting Food Ideas

LASAGNA CLAM CHOWDER

- 1/2 cup diced celery
- 1/2 cup diced green pepper
- 1/2 cup diced onion
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 3 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 1/2 can (40 oz.) Chef Boy-ar-dee Lasagna
- 2 cups tomato juice
- 1/2 dozen cherry stone clams, washed
- or 1 can (8 oz.) minced clams
- dash hot pepper
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire Sauce
- 3 tablespoons chopped parsley

Saute celery, peppers, onion and garlic in butter until wilted. Combine celery mixture, lasagna and tomato juice. Simmer for 5 minutes. Add washed clams or minced clams and remaining ingredients. Heat for another 10 minutes until clams open. Garnish with chopped parsley. Serves 4.

LASAGNA SALMON CASSEROLE

- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1/2 cup chopped green pepper
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 1/2 can (40 oz.) Chef Boy-ar-dee Lasagna
- 1/4 cup sour cream
- 1 can (7-3/4 oz.) salmon
- 1/2 cup shredded Cheddar cheese
- 1 package (10 oz.) frozen mixed vegetables, cooked and drained

Saute onion, peppers, garlic in butter. Combine all ingredients except mixed vegetables. Pour half of lasagna mixture in bottom of 2-quart casserole; top with mixed vegetables; add remaining lasagna mixture and bake in a preheated 350°F. oven for 30 minutes. Serves 4.

BSU Graduates Include Nyssans

Idaho Senator Frank Church will be at Boise State University Sunday, May 16 to deliver what could be one of the most publicized commencement addresses in the school's history. Church's speech to BSU graduates and their guests will come in the midst of his critical campaign in the late Western primaries.

Commencement ceremonies will start at 2 p.m. in Bronco Stadium.

Over 1,100 students at Boise State are candidates for baccalaureate degrees, vocational-technical certificates or associate degrees. Candidates include Mary Joki (cum laude), elementary education and Serena Stephen, registered nursing, both Nyssa.

Our Neighbors Are Interested Too!

The following editorial appeared in The Observer, La Grande, Oregon, on Thursday, May 13, 1976, and it may also be of interest to you.

A pair of little-noticed elections in Eastern Oregon are carrying a warning to new and old circuit judges around the state. Judges Jeff Dorroh of Vale and Lyle Wolff of Baker have found themselves with opponents.

Circuit judges must seek re-election once each six years. For the most part they run unopposed. There is a reluctance on the part of attorneys to oppose a sitting judge who is performing his duties adequately.

This year, however, Dorroh and Wolff have opponents. The opponents are not palsies,

either. Each is aggressive, well-known locally, and is working hard. Dorroh even felt he had to hire some professional campaign strategy help in order to get re-elected.

The warning is this: Judges need to pay attention to their courtroom manners. Some judges, a very few, unfortunately tend either to be rude to defendants or other litigants, or to jurors or attorneys. Both Wolff and Dorroh have been accused of such rudeness. And those persons who find themselves involved in court proceedings, one way or another, don't like it.

Grain Crop Loans Continued In 1976

Russell Fullerton, Chairman, Malheur County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Committee, reminds producers that anniversary type loans will be continued for wheat and feedgrains, and reinstated soybean loans, for the 1976 crops.

"Anniversary loans offer producers an opportunity to obtain cash and hold their crops for later sale and to even out marketings," Fullerton explained. "Such loans mature 11 months following the end of the month in which the loans are made."

Fullerton said that although soybean loans were not available for the 1975 crop, they will be in effect this year, and may be obtained, along with corn and sorghum, from harvest through May 31, 1977. Loans for wheat, oats, barley and rye may be obtained from harvest through March 31, 1977.

"As in the past, the producer has the option of storing his grain under loan either on the farm or in an approved warehouse," Fullerton said.

Warehouse-stored loans will be disbursed on the basis of the full-count loan rate which means the producer will have to prepay storage to the maturity date of the loan.

Fullerton noted that to be eligible for a warehouse-stored loan, the producer needs to store his grain in a warehouse approved by Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC). The producer must obtain a warehouse receipt which is used by the ASCS county office to compute the loan based on the specific quantity and quality shown

on the receipt.

Another requirement for loan eligibility is that the warehouse receipt show storage has been prepaid to the last day of the eleventh month following the month in which the warehouse receipt was issued. The loan will mature on that date regardless of when the loan is made.

If the producer does not wish to obtain a loan until sometime after the warehouse receipt is issued, he has two options by which he may obtain the full 12 months loan period: 1) he may return to the warehouse and pay the additional storage required to obtain the 12 months loan; or 2) he may, at the time of deposit of his grain, prepay storage charges for 13 or more months, depending on the date he intends to take out a loan.

To obtain a farm-stored loan, Fullerton said, the producer needs to certify at his ASCS county office the number of bushels of grain he has in suitable storage. The loan amount will then be computed by multiplying the eligible quantity of grain in storage times the loan rate for the county in which the grain is stored.

For a farm-stored loan, the producer has the option of taking a loan on a quantity of grain less than the total eligible and of paying off all or a part of the loan at any time during the loan period. A requirement under the loan agreement is that the producer maintain the quality of the loan collateral and that he notify his county office prior to using or selling any of the grain pledged for loan.
