Several local people remember the Jenkins. Gertie Smith, of Nyssa, remembers a white polar bear rug that was on the living room floor.

Another well-known Nyssan, who lived in the house, was Mary McConnell. At the time, she told me about it, she still had the antique furnishings that they had in that house. Her husband was a sheepman.

In 1924. Mr. Cranston rented the ranch to Harvey Kindall. The family lived there till 1930.

Mr. Cranston passed away and the place went to his son Walter. He sold it to the Frahms, who moved there in 1932. You may think from this


