Chocolate Wheat Germ Cookies

...make now and bake later

1/4 cup butter, softened
1 cup sugar
1 egg
1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract
2 cups flour
3/4 cup vacuum packed wheat germ (regular)*
1/2 cup cocoa
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup finely chopped walnuts (optional)

Beat butter and sugar until fluffy. Beat in egg and vanilla. Mix in flour combined with wheat germ, cocoa, salt and soda. Stir in nuts. Divide dough in half. Shape each part into 1 1/2-inch diameter roll. Wrap. Chill 2 hours or longer. Cut into 1/4-inch thick slices. Place on lightly greased baking sheet. Bake in 350° oven about 10 to 12 minutes. Remove cookies and cool on rack. Makes about 6 dozen.

...new taste for old-fashioned favorite

1 1/2 cups peanut butter
1/4 cup cooking oil
1 cup brown sugar (packed)
1 egg
1/2 cup milk
2 cups flour
1 cup vacuum packed wheat germ (regular)*
1/2 teaspoon soda
1/2 teaspoon salt

Beat peanut butter with oil, brown sugar and egg. Stir in milk. Add flour mixed with wheat germ, soda and salt. Mix just enough to combine. Shape dough into 1-inch balls. Place on ungreased baking sheet. Flatten with fork dipped in flour, making crisscross marks on top. Bake in 350° oven 10 to 15 minutes. Makes about 5 dozen.

Wheat Germ Gingersnaps

...thin, crisp and spicy

1/4 cup butter, softened
1/4 cup sugar
1 egg
1/4 cup light molasses
1 teaspoon grated lemon peel
1 tablespoon lemon juice
3/4 cup vacuum packed wheat germ (regular)*
1 1/4 cups flour
1 1/2 teaspoons ginger
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon cloves
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon soda

Beat butter with sugar until fluffy. Beat in egg, then molasses, lemon peel and juice. Combine 1/2 cup wheat germ with flour, spices, salt and soda. Stir into molasses mixture. Chill dough. Shape into 1-inch balls. Roll balls in remaining 1/4 cup wheat germ. Place about 3 inches apart on greased baking sheet. Flatten with bottom of glass dipped in sugar. Bake in 350 deg. oven 12 to 15 minutes or until lightly browned. Remove from baking sheet and cool on rack. Makes about 3 dozen (3 to 3 1/2-inch) cookies.
