

Oregon Educational Television Approved

Robert Harrod, Malheur IED supervisor, has received word that a grant to the Oregon Educational Public Broadcasting Service has been approved by HEW in the amount of \$235,000.00 to provide Oregon Educational Television to Southeastern Oregon. The Oregon Legislature had earlier voted additional funds to match this grant in the amount of approximately \$100,000.00.

Preliminary work has already begun on the translator network which will bring the signal of KOAP (Portland) to this area. It is hoped that the signal will be on the air within one year.

The cities of Vale, Ontario, Nyssa, Adrian and all nearby rural areas will be able to

receive the KOAP signal off the air. Therefore, the service will be beneficial to local citizens as well as the public school. It is not clear if the signal will reach all rural schools such as Juntura and Jordan Valley, but should be available in most other areas of the Malheur County.

According to Superintendent Leroy Paulsen, Malheur IED, in cooperation with the local schools and city governments, has been working for several years to secure this service which will give our area a link with the rest of the state of Oregon and he believes it will be of great value in keeping students and other citizens of Malheur County better informed on matters pertaining to Oregon

TVCC Offers Courses For Summer Quarter

The Treasure Valley Community College Business Department will offer more than a dozen courses during summer quarter. Two new courses in the secretarial field are on the schedule. Medical Machine Transcription is designed to develop skill in machine transcription of medical case histories and terminology. Legal Transcription covers a working vocabulary of legal terms and a basic knowledge for the preparation of legal documents, correspondence, and court documents. These classes meet Monday through Thursday from 10 to 12:15 and from 5:45 to 8 in the evenings.

A number of other business classes will be offered

during the day, Monday through Thursday each week. Introduction to Business will meet 9-10 a.m. Business Law will meet at 10-11 a.m. Business Math will meet at 8-9 a.m. Secretarial Accounting will meet 3:30-5:45 p.m. Office Machines will meet 1:30-3:30 p.m. Bookkeeping I will meet 3:30-5:45 p.m. Two sections of typing will be offered 10:00-12:15 and 5:45-8:00. Two sections of shorthand will be offered 10:00-12:15 and 5:45-8:00.

These classes are part of a comprehensive summer program in a variety of fields of study available during Treasure Valley Community College's summer session which begins June 21.

Rochelle Roberts Active Girl Scout In London, England

Rochelle Roberts, granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dyrre Roberts of Adrian, Oregon, living in London, England, was recently awarded her First-Class Girl Scout pin at a fly-up ceremony at the American School in London. Rochelle is the second Girl Scout to ever receive this award among the 13 London neighborhoods. The Girl Scouts are sponsored by the North Atlantic

Girl Scouts based in Heidelberg, Germany which was established for children of troops on foreign soil.

Rochelle was also chosen to represent her troop at a Country-wide Bicentennial celebration which was held May 28 to May 31 at Sculthorpe Air Force Base, Norfolk, England. An estimated 300 girls from the United Kingdom, Iceland, Norway and Denmark will be participating in this event.

Army Opportunities Many For Enlistees

With over 400 job specialties, the Army offers many opportunities to get valuable on-the-job training for future civilian employment. The pay is pretty good too—starting at \$361 a month, plus room and board and free medical and dental care. If married, an enlistee receives a quarters allowance of \$116.10 a month in addition to his base pay. A grade E4, base pay is \$459.30 a month (quarters allowance: \$134.40).

Service women may have the opportunity to get into unusual career areas—jobs just not possible in civilian life. Some women have chosen to serve in airborne units, mechanical work, veterinary corps, military police etc.

The Army enlistee who so desires may elect to further his education while in service. Free college instruction is available at some installations. Project AHEAD (Army Help for Education and Development) is an in-service program through which college credits may be earned, with the Army absorbing up

to 75% of the costs. Some units allow duty time off to attend college courses. For those servicemen who complete three years of honorable service, educational benefits under the GI bill are still available.

Pluses: Specialized training and no lay off worries during a period of high unemployment. Travel. Thirty days paid vacation every year. No fighting war going on.

Possible drawbacks: You can't quit just because you don't like it, unless the Army fails to live up to its contract with the enlistee.

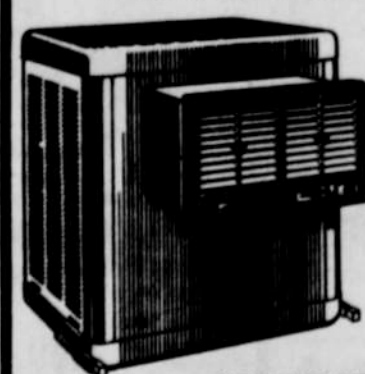

Photo Drivers Licenses After July 1

If your driver's license is due to expire in July, don't worry if you do not get a renewal notice as early as usual.

The Motor Vehicles Division has changed the mailing schedule for renewal notices because the state's color photo driver license program, which takes effect on July 1, will bring a new way to renew licenses for half the drivers due to renew after that date.

Here is the mailing schedule for July renewals:

Renewal notices for drivers not scheduled to get a photo license in July (those with even-numbered birthdates, will be mailed by the Division about June 4. These drivers are urged to renew by mail as soon as possible so that field offices can concentrate on the photo license business during July.

Renewal notices for drivers scheduled to get photo licenses in July will be mailed on a staggered basis. Those for drivers with odd-numbered birthdates with licenses expiring between July 1 and July 9 will be mailed

about June 15. Those with licenses expiring between July 11 and 19 will be mailed about June 22, and those expiring between July 21 and July 31 will be mailed about July 9. These drivers must renew in person at a DMV office or examination station.

The staggered mailing schedule will help spread the workload over the initial weeks of the conversion to photo licenses. Drivers with odd-numbered birthdates who renew before July 1 will be issued old-style paper licenses.

The Division says drivers should be sure to read the instructions printed on renewal notices. Renewal procedures and fees differ for those scheduled to get photo licenses and those who are not scheduled to get the new type of license until they renew two years from now.
