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EEG Now in Use at Malheur Memorial

The EEG-Electroencephalogram-is a machine which records the electrical impulses of the brain and reports where and what parts of a brain have gone wrong when a person is ill. And Malheur Memorial Hospital now has one.

Actually they only have part of one. The \$8,000 machine is capable of recording and transmitting brain waves, but is not capable of

displaying or printing out the information. The information is transmitted to Mercy Medical Center in Nampa, over private telephone lines, where they have display and printout equipment. In Nampa, two doctors read, interpret and analyze the data and give their diagnosis over the phone.

Dr. Brandon Adams, who has been at Malheur Memorial since January, "established the need for an EEG," said hospital administrator Jim Mattes. Adams is a general practitioner, but is interested in psychology, "the science of mind." The EEG is a powerful diagnostic tool which has been used for many years in finding brain disorders. Tumors and blood clots are two of the many problems which an EEG can find.

It is also used in diagnosing mental problems, the other major reason for its recent purchase from Neurodiagnostic Systems in San Francisco.

Malheur Memorial has recently signed a contract with Malheur County Mental Health Clinic for emergency treatment and analysis.

Briefly, the EEG contains a series of electrodes, little cups of metal at the ends of wires, which are attached to the person's head at certain spots. These electrodes are sensitive to the electrical impulses traveling through the brain. The impulses should be the same throughout the brain. This represents normal, unimpaired functioning. If there is damage anywhere in the brain, the electrodes attached to the corresponding part of the scalp will record the difference. By interpreting the printouts, doctors can diagnose the problem and recommend treatment.

At Malheur Memorial Delroy Matthews, a medical technician, will be the "tech" as Mattes said, for EEG tests. Drs. Harold Brown and Roger Curran are the Nampa neurologists (nervous system specialists) who will diagnose for Malheur. The brain is the director of the nervous system.

Collision Kills Five

A car-truck collision southwest of Nyssa Saturday afternoon at the junction of Klamath Avenue and Lytle Boulevard killed five persons and injured the sixth.

Dead are Mrs. Marion Cooley, 46, Ontario; her sister, Julia Becker, 39, Ontario; and Donna Melton, 23, Ontario, daughter of Mrs. Cooley; Wallace Flippence, 63, Nyssa, and his son, Leroy Flippence, 35, Nyssa. All were riding in the car which Mrs. Cooley was driving. She apparently missed seeing a stop sign at the Lytle Blvd. exchange and her car was struck by a pickup driven by Mary Findling, 25, Nyssa.

All five were killed instantly, State Police officer who investigated said. He found no skid marks at the scene. No citations were issued.

Mrs. Findling was released from Holy Rosary Sunday.

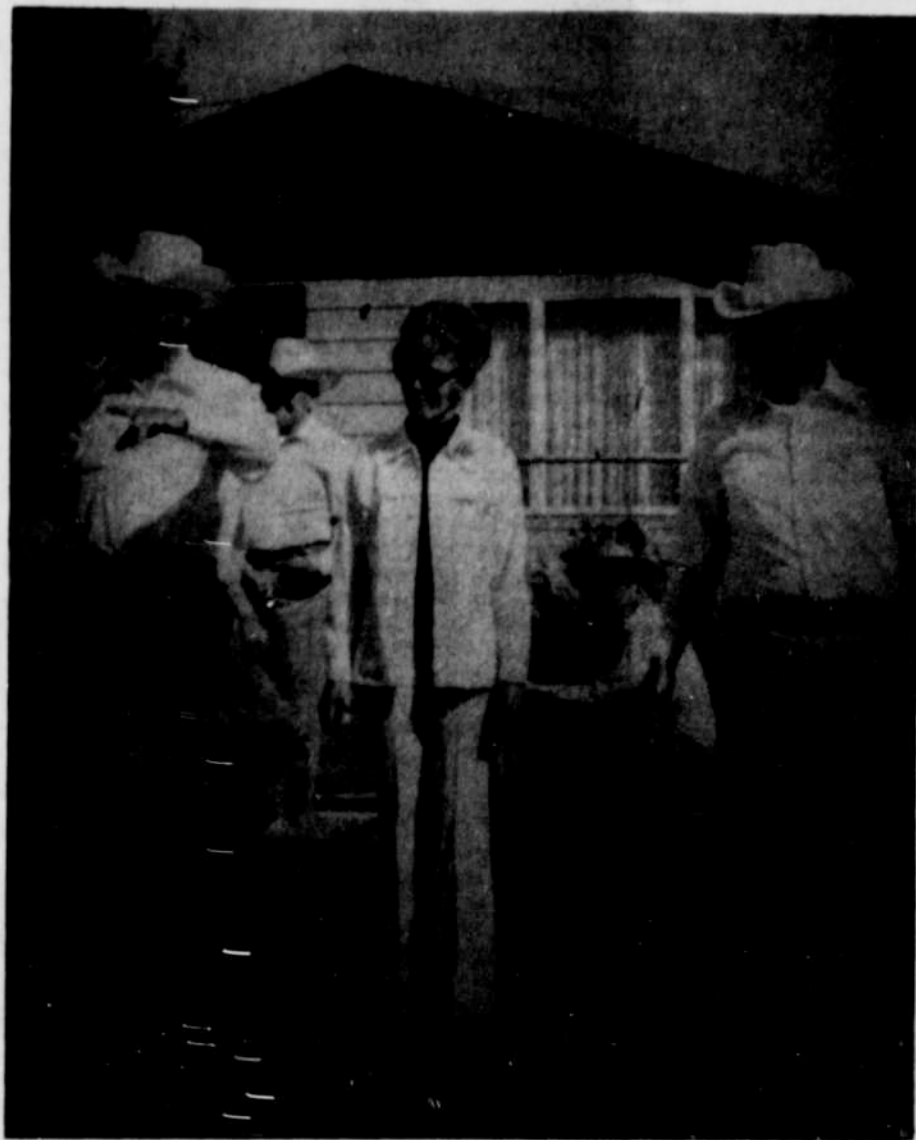

Sugar Company Opens Boise Office

The Amalgamated Sugar Company has established and opened an office in downtown Boise for its factory operations management personnel. The office complex is located at Suite 352 in the newly renovated Sonna Building, 910 Main Street.

John R. Corsberg, vice president of operations, has been transferred from the general office in Ogden to head the activities of the new Boise office.

J. Ron Bingham, safety director and manager of scheduling and labor relations, has also been moved from Ogden to the Boise location. A third sugar

factory official will join these two later in the year. He is Stan Newman, who will be assigned as assistant to the vice president of operations. Newman is presently the factory superintendent at the company's plant at Rupert. The move was made to improve management communications with all four of the company's sugar factories, which are located at Rupert, Twin Falls, Nampa, and Nyssa.

"Being in Boise will make it much easier and more efficient for us to coordinate factory operations and to assist local management with their efforts and problems," Corsberg explained.

TVCC Budget Election June 29

Tuesday, June 29, Treasure Valley Community College will present its 1976-77 budget proposal to the public for the third time. This will be the last voting opportunity before the end of the fiscal year when current operating funds will run out.

The total operating budget proposed for next year is \$2,161,910, a reduction of \$96,814 from the first election several months ago. This economy was effected through an increase in tuition and cutbacks in programs, personnel needs and services.

The entirety of the savings was applied to the proposed local tax levy to bring it down to \$859,400.

The college, which cannot operate without approval of a local tax levy, has increased the budget 5.5% over last year, not quite enough to offset inflation. The tax rate necessary to raise this amount is \$2.61 per thousand assessed valuation. Last year's rate was approved at \$2.62 per thousand.

College officials emphasize that Treasure Valley Community College has no tax base on which to rely in the event of another budget defeat and is solvent beyond June 30 each year only upon approval of a budget at the local level. Tax base proposals have been rejected on three past occasions.

They also assure the public that the college will carry through in its commitment for summer school even should the budget be defeated June 29. It would require the college requesting a repayable advance from the state to supplement a small cash carry-over and student tuition to pay expenses. After that, any further plans for operation during 1976-77 involve serious financial risk and must be made with the knowledge that the college cannot be certain of instituting them.

Polls will be open throughout the college district from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Voters are urged to cast their ballots June 29.

School District Budget Election Tuesday, June 29

Nyssa School District No. 26 will hold its budget election Tuesday, June 29 at the Primary School with the polls open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Voters will be asked to approve a tax levy of \$240,922 outside the six percent limitation.

The 1976-77 budget shows an increase of \$198,586 over the previous year's budget, with total budget requirements \$1,598,875.

Superintendent W. L. McPartland said that part of the increase comes as a result of the schools moving into their new buildings rapidly nearing completion. Increases in heating, maintenance, insu-

rance and fixed charges will come this year as the buildings are completed. Many of these expenses have been borne by TVCC and the churches who supplied facilities since the fire, McPartland said.

Teachers salary increases totaling \$80,162 will be the largest single item in the new budget, McPartland said. The increase will be 6.8% added to the base salary. This figure was agreed upon between the teachers and the negotiating committee based on the cost of living index.

Increases in operation of the plant are estimated to be \$45,217, and fixed charges will be an increase of \$34,466. Land purchases of \$12,000 for additional property and a sprinkling system and landscaping around the new high school are other major increases in the budget.

An additional item not in last year's budget is for operation of the cafeteria. The cafeteria is largely self-supporting through school lunch charges, McPartland said.

School Open House

The Nyssa School District will hold an open house Sunday, June 27 from 2 to 5 p.m. in the new high school classroom building. Members of the school board and building committee will be present to answer questions, and to serve as guides.

Everyone is invited to inspect this beautiful new building, the first of the buildings to be completed in the school rebuilding program.

Directors installed were George Craig, Joe Garner, Pancho Rios and Jim Monroe.

Nyssa Approves Annexation

Nyssa city council approved annexation of the Sparks-Baker mobile home tract which abuts the north city limits at a special session Friday noon.

The entire council attended the session at which the third and final reading of the annexation ordinance passed.

Councilmen were informed that the Patton mobile home foundation variance violation matter had been settled with the issuance of a building permit for the installation of a proper foundation.

Payette Publisher Dies

Larry Robinson, 60, publisher-editor of the Payette Independent Enterprise and former president of the Idaho Press Association, died in Payette Sunday night, June 20, 1976.

Robinson was the publisher of the Payette weekly newspaper since 1965. In 1950, while publisher of the Minidoka County News at Rupert, he served as president of the Idaho Press Association, which is now the Idaho Newspaper Association.

He was preceded in death by his wife, who died this past March 17.

Fair Show Signed, Van Dyke to Appear

"LeRoy Van Dyke" and "The Auctioneers" will headline entertainment at the 1976 Malheur County Fair along with the Ira Allen Show.

Gordon Capps, Malheur County Fair Board chairman, announced that Dolly Parton, formerly signed to perform at this year's Fair, had been forced to cancel all professional engagements throughout the summer due to ill health.

Capps said that Van Dyke is a well-known country-western entertainer and the Board was fortunate to sign him. Van Dyke is well-known as an auctioneer, as well as a singer, and recently performed in both capacities at the Royal Manitoba Winter Fair in Brandon, Manitoba. He maintains his own cattle farm near Nashville where he is developing his own strain of Chianinas.

Van Dyke will perform at 2:30 p.m. and again at 7:30 on Thursday, August 19.

Fairgoers this year will also be able to enjoy a carnival. Wolfson Amusement Company of Walla Walla, Washington, has been contracted to bring a number of kiddie and senior rides as well as carnival concessions

for the Fair. Special days are planned by the carnival manager for different age groups and Capps said this information will be available through local news media.

A special pageant, "The Oregon Story," will be given on Wednesday at 2:30 in the afternoon and again at 7:30 p.m. This is put on by drama students from Oregon State University.

Capps said the fair promises to be an outstanding one. Space in the Commercial Building is over 90% sold, and requests for exhibit information and space have been received from several states and from other parts of Oregon.
