School Elections Tuesday

Nyssa school patrons face two very important elections next Tuesday. At stake is both the School District No. 26 budget, and the Treasure Valley Community College budget.

We heard a man say earlier this week that he was going to vote No on both budgets, and we can only ask "Why?" These are not elections to vote on new taxes, but to sustain programs, and very important programs that are already in existence.

The college budget is up for approval for the third time, and the levy is consistent with that of the last several years, and down 1c from that approved in the current budget. Last year we approved a \$2.62 tax rate per thousand assessed valuation, and the amount to be voted on this year is \$2.61.

TVCC does not have a tax base, and the entire levy must be approved each year for the college to exist. Unfortunately, community colleges are financed partly by property tax, as are our local school districts, so we as taxpayers have the responsibility of keeping them in operation.

Our state universities would be hard-pressed, in fact it would be physically impossible to accommodate the 90,000 or more community college students now attending these schools in Oregon. TVCC, as does Blue Mountain Community College in Pendleton and Central Oregon at Bend, fulfills our needs in Eastern Oregon, as do the other ten colleges in Western Oregon.

School District Budget

The Nyssa school budget is an entirely different proposition this year, but more than ever, we think, our schools deserve strong support.

We will be asked to approve an amount \$240,922 outside the six percent limitation. It goes without saying that there is a sizeable increase in the budget, and the reasons are both understandable and necessary.

Since June 5, 1974, the date of the fire, our school building maintenance has been unexpectedly low. We haven't had buildings, or not many, and most of the expenses of heating and maintenance have been borne by the LDS Church, Nazarene Church, Methodist Church, TVCC and Mr. and Mrs. Al Chadwick, who have provided quarters in their building at little expense to the district. They deserve our thanks.

Now that our new buildings are nearing completion and will be occupied during this school year, they must be maintained. A totally new experience requiring some educated guesses as to actual expenses, it would seem hard for us as outsiders to second guess the long months of study put in by the school board and budget committee.

We agree with those of you who protest ever increasing taxes. We can't agree that we should take out our frustrations on our local institutions which exist entirely as a result of our efforts, and for our benefit.

We believe that the Nyssa Schools and Treasure Valley Community College both deserve our continued support.

The Nyssa School Board wishes to thank the community for its support and vote of confidence in getting our new school complex this year completed. The opening of new schools will also require the school district to pay for utilities that were being carried by churches and TVCC. Some of these additional costs are for heat and lights, increased insurance costs and inflation in general.

I hope each of you will support your school budget next Tuesday, June 29, 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. at the Nyssa Primary Building.

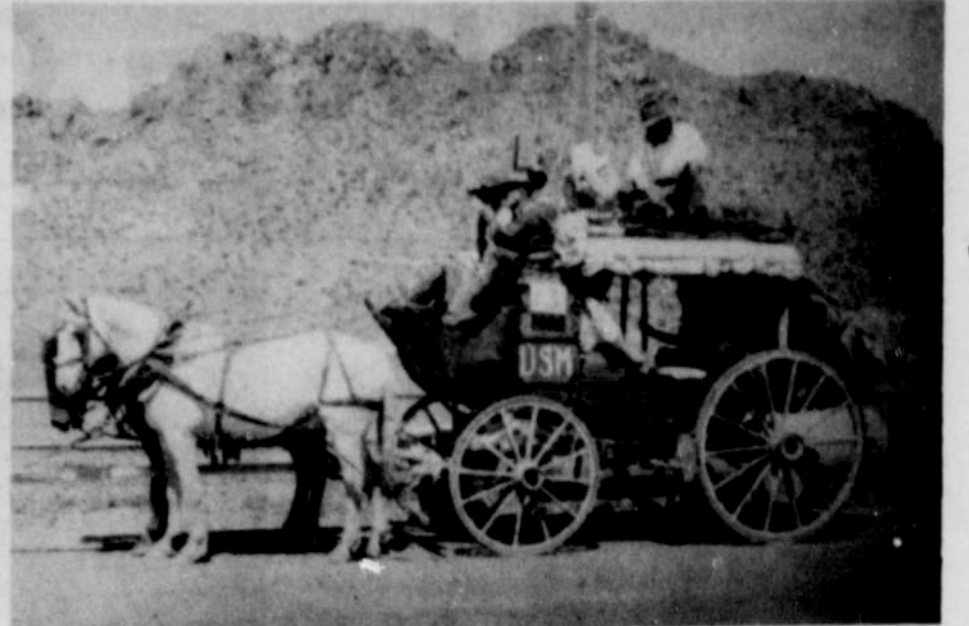

NYSSA HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT CONDUCT CODE

Visitors are permitted on the school grounds only after first reporting to the main office and stating their business.

Food and Drink - No food or drink is permitted in the carpeted areas at any time. Food is permitted only in the cafeteria, student commons or outside.

Noon Hours - During noon hours, students will be allowed only in designated areas or off campus.

Gymnasium - No food or beverages are allowed on the gym floors at any time. Street shoes are not permitted on the gym floor while engaging in sport activities.

In The Halls - If you must be in the halls while classes are being conducted it is mandatory that you do nothing to distract a class in session.

Prohibited at School - Squirt guns, firecrackers, shaving cream, water balloons or any other article of a disruptive or dangerous nature.

Student Parking - Parking allowed only in designated student parking areas.

Assembly Conduct - Excessive noise or rowdiness will not be permitted during assemblies including pep, school and national school assemblies. Persons who act immaturely will lose the privilege of going to these assemblies.

Littering - If you are caught littering on the school grounds or in the school building, you are subject to a fine or penalty.

Running - No running in the halls for any reason.

Fighting - No fighting or scuffling in the halls or classrooms at any time.

No Tobacco, no alcoholic beverages and no narcotics are permitted in school or on the school grounds at any time.

Care of School Property is put into your hands. If you abuse school property, you will be held responsible.

Snowballing - Snowballing is not permitted on school grounds at any time.

This Student Conduct Code was devised by the Student Council to protect students and school properties from disruptive activities and conduct.
