Clyde and Nell Bowers fished at Phillips dam, Thursday. Very windy.

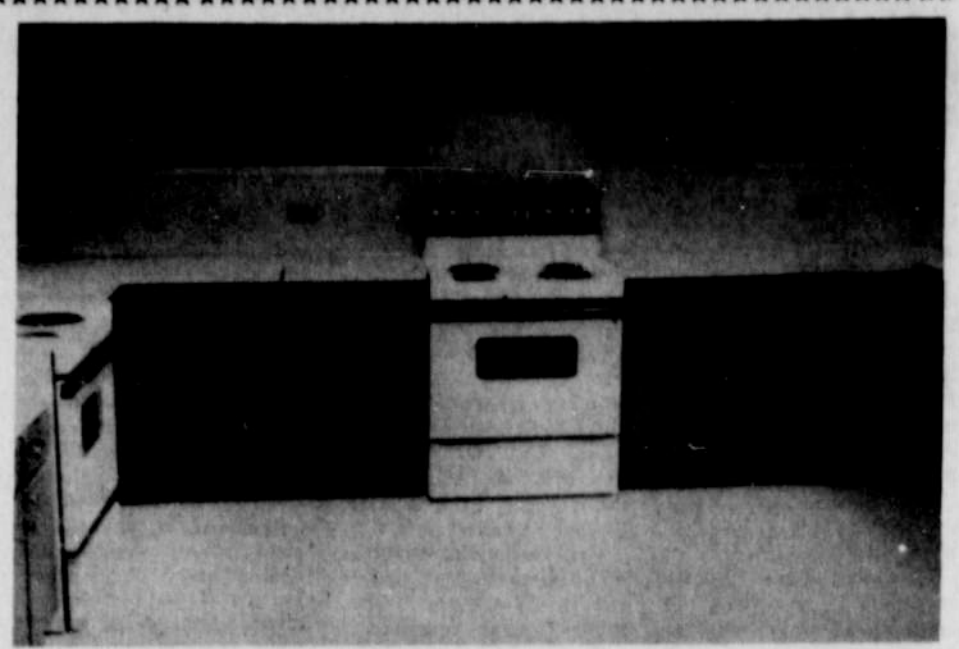
Your County Agent Says

As the irrigation season progresses willows along our ditch banks become more of a problem. Solution? They can be easily killed in July or August by straying thoroughly with 2# 2,4-D LV ester and a spreader-sticker, per 100 gallons water and spray to wet all foliage. This works better than cutting because roots are killed and no regrowth should occur. Care should be taken that spray doesn't drift into susceptible crops adjacent to the ditches.

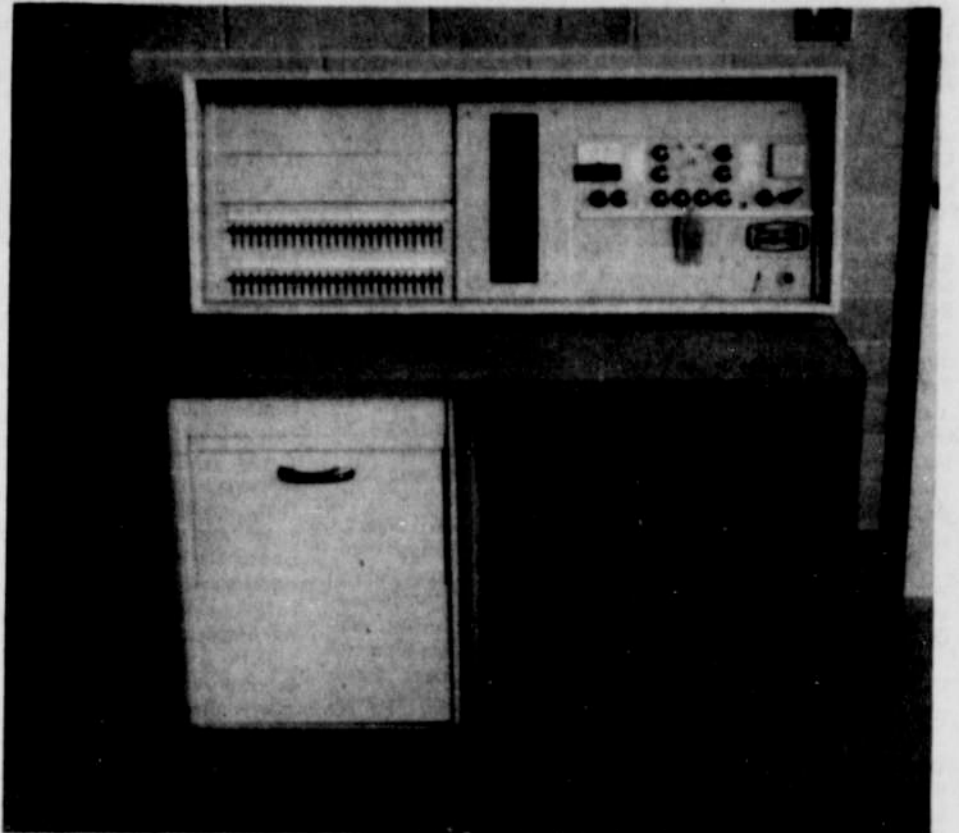
Perennial weed patches are painfully obvious in fields and waste areas about now as they begin to bloom and run their cycle for another year. Controlling them is costly and time consuming, and requires a different approach than the usual selective control applied in most crops.

First, the timing is usually different and second, the materials used and the rates at which they are applied are different.

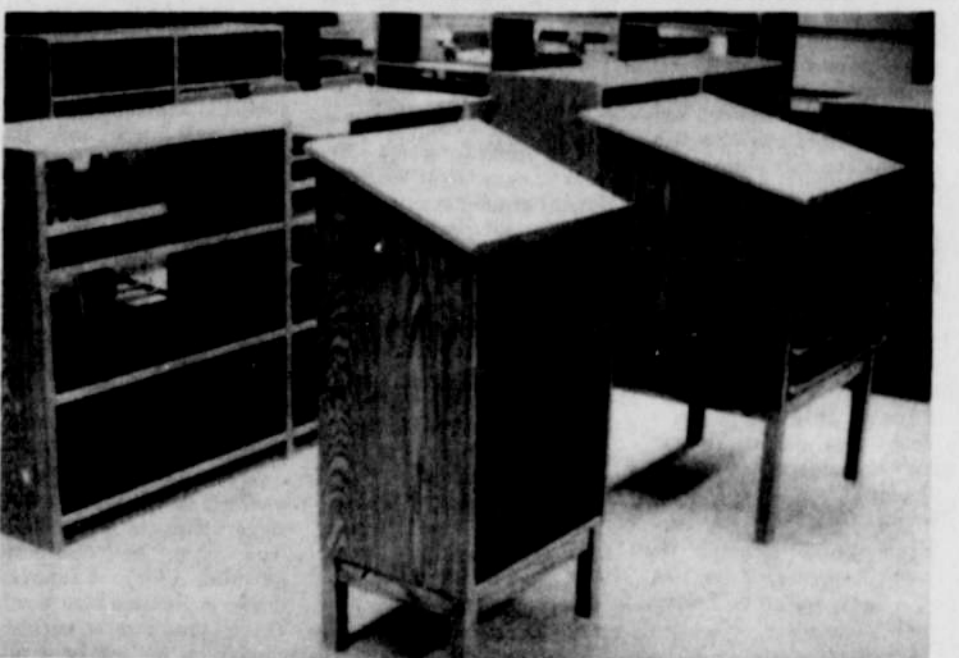
For instance, in a selective control program for annual weeds the grower wants to apply the weed killer either before the weeds germinate or when they are very small. Rates applied are, for the most part, low.
