Mrs. Stam Named Nyssa CF Campaign Chairman

Mrs. Louis Stam of Nyssa has been named chairman of the Nyssa Breath-of-Life Campaign to fight children's lung diseases, according to Pat Straub, 1976 campaign chairman, Oregon Chapter Cystic Fibrosis Foundation. Mrs. Stam will lead volunteers in raising funds to support research and care programs for children affected by lung damaging diseases like cystic fibrosis, severe asthma, chronic bronchitis, bronchiectasis, and a condition called "childhood emphysema."

The goal for Nyssa is \$293.00 with the campaign kick-off with a house-to-house appeal on Sunday, September 12.

Cystic fibrosis is an incurable genetic disease and is inherited when both parents carry the recessive C/F gene. It is estimated that one in 20, or 10 million, Americans carry that C/F gene, usually without knowing it. Current research, funded by the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation, is seeking a practical test to identify these carriers.

The Idaho-Oregon Buddhist Temple in Ontario is celebrating its 30th Japan Nite Obon Festival, Saturday July 17.

Obon is the Buddhist Memorial season and most Buddhists of the world pay respect to their ancestors and family members who have passed on into Nirvana. It is not, however, a sorrowful occasion. After having the religious services, with chanting and sermons, Buddhists join together in a big

celebration which is called the Obon Odori. It is said that the spirits of the deceased return home during this season to visit their homes.

Therefore, in Japan, Buddhists clean their homes and yards to welcome the spirits. They offer fruits drinks and food at the Shrine in their homes for them to enjoy.

The activities on Saturday, July 17 are as follows:

5 to 8 p.m., open house of the Temple Sanctuary. A taped narration will give

information about the Temple and Jodo Shinshu Buddhism.

5 to 8 p.m. Boxed dinners will be served in the basement. Guests may dine at the temple or take boxed dinners home.

8 to 10 p.m., (Folk Dancing). Among the dances will be Ontario's sister city's own odori. A special dance is being created to the tune of a patriotic American song in honor of the 200th birthday of the United States.

There is no charge for visiting the temple, nor for the Obon Odori. However, the food consisting of chicken Teriyaki, shrimp tempura, noodles, shishkabobs, sunomono salad, rice pies and cakes are available for a nominal cost.

In addition to the above activities, there will be a display of Japanese items, including flower arrangements and beautiful Japanese costumes.

After the Obon Odori a prize drawing will be held for valuable prizes, consisting of 2 portable TV sets, a stereo tape player, a Polaroid camera and many other items.
